

INTENSIVE WHEAT GROWING. Ackley, quartermaster sergeant.

Startling Results Claimed For a Rus sian's Methods.

Some years ago, says an English publication, a Russian farmer discovered a method of increasing the yield of wheat in so startling a manner that no one believed he was telling the truth.

That does sound like a miracle, and we do not vouch for it, but here is the method, and if any farmer has the patience to try it he will certainly be sur prised at the result.

Each grain is planted separately in a sunken bed about fifteen inches deep and three and a half feet in width.

As soon as the grain sprouts the little blade is covered with a thin layer of earth about an inch and a half in depth. The result is that you get three stalks instead of one. At the end f three weeks the hoe comes into use again, and the three stalks being covered with earth, turn into nine stalks.
