When the Gaston people realized they must have a new school, they decided to build for the future. They put up not only a schoolhouse but a community center building. The literary and reading room is open to the public evenings and Saturday afternoons. A Victrola has been installed and an abundance of records provided. Principal R. E. Winger has arranged to maintain a state traveling library in the school, and is open for all pubic gatherings.

Principal Winger is considering installation of night classes for adults and of a weekly moving picture in the school auditorium.

"The Gaston school represents the realization of one of the main ideas of the schools of extension and education of the University," said Dr. Ayer.
