MILITAMEN STILL HOPE

In Spite of Difficulties, Oregon City Company Makes Game Fight

With eleven members yet to be gained, G Company, Oregon National Guard—otherwise known as Oregon City's militia company—is making a game fight against great odds to keep from being mustered out. And added to the troubles the company has already had, threats have been made that its armory would be taken away from it for failure to pay rent. However, arrangements have been made with the adjutant general's office to pay the rent in arrears from last year, and if the company commanders can straighten out difficulties over this year's rent, all may yet be well.

The company took a lease on Busch's hall some time ago, agreeing to pay \$65 a month rental. This sum was not forthcoming promptly, and recently the company was served with notice to get out, or else was offered the hall on a monthly lease at \$75 per month. Such an offer was prohibitive to further use of the hall, but heartened by the offer of local businessmen to contribute to the support of the company, officers and friends of the organization are now making an effort to get the rent back to the original figure—which it is believed can be met.

Captain Blanchard, of the company, says that if the company loses its hall, it will mean the virtual disbandment of the organization; as there is no other available drill room in the city. When the businessmen of the county seat have offered support, and when recruits have been coming in at a favorable rate, it is considered unfortunate indeed that a little matter like ten dollars a month excess rent should stand in the way of the company's success. The militiamen and their friends are now making a final effort to straighten out all difficulties, so that the company may be continued; and it is believed that these efforts will prove successful.

BARLOW VOTERS HIT

Registrar Wasn't a Citizen, and All Must Register Again as Result

When County Clerk Harrington appointed Mrs. W. F. White as district registrar at Barlow, she inadvertently piled up a lot of grief for Barlow voters. It appears that Registrar White's husband isn't a citizen of the United States, and that as a result the eighty odd folk that were registered aren't registered at all, and will have to sign the rolls over again. Miss Harrington made a trip to Barlow this week to look into the tangle, and hopes now to have matters straightened out before the registration period closes.

Mr. White was born in England and was naturalized here many years ago. Later he spent several years in Canada, where he took a part in Canadian politics and bought land from the Canadian government. He was not aware of the fact that his activity in the provinces to the north revoked his citizenship to the United States.

When the time came to appoint registrars throughout the county, Clerk Harrington named Mrs. A. M. White, his wife, as registrar. Mr. White produced his naturalization papers on a registered, believing that he was a full citizen. Mrs. White, acting in good faith, proceeded with her duties as registrar, and enrolled the names of 80 voters on the poll records. Saturday Clerk Harrington heard of Mr. White's trip to Canada and of his loss of citizenship through his activities there. She appointed George Berg registrar to take the place of Mrs. White, and it will be necessary to re-register all the voters in the precinct.

MAYOR SEEKS LIGHT

Oregon City's Executive Wants to Know All About City Lighting

Anybody who knows anything about municipal lighting plants and how they will work will confer a favor upon Mayor E. C. Hackett of the county seat by sending the information to him. Mr. Hackett thinks that Oregon City ought to utilize its water power rights at the basin and install an electric light plant for the city's benefit. The mayor wants to authorize any such action himself, but he wants to put all the available facts before the voters, and let them decide whether or not the county seat should have its own light factory.

In the course of his search for information Mr. Hackett has written to Eugene, to get information about the municipal light and power plant in that city. People in Eugene pay a lower rate than the one charged in Oregon City, and the municipal plant has a profit to its credit. The same may be said of Tacoma, Washington, where a large municipal hydro-electric plant furnishes both light and power at very low rates, and is competing successfully with one of the largest commercial plants in the world.

Would Lower Taxes

R. E. Woodward, candidate for republican nomination as assessor, is one of those men who believe that the only way to lower taxes is to elect men to office who will conduct the county business economically; and who will themselves fight for lower taxes. Mr. Woodward has been in the real estate business in this county for years, and is familiar with land values and taxation problems, and believes that he can so administer the affairs of the assessor's office so that the county will receive full value in taxes collected, and at the same time the levy will be kept down. Mr. Woodward promises that if he is elected there will be no favoritism shown in assessments, everybody will receive an honest deal on valuation, and the unfeeling man will be given just as fair and square treatment as will the prominent and influential folk. GLADSTONE MEN POOR

City Employees Get No Pay for March Work Owing to Council Split

When Councilmen Clyde, Goodman and Parrish, of Gladstone "insured" over the troubles in regard to the conduct of the water department, they pushed over a bunch of grief upon the city employees as well. While they have been able to hold Water Superintendent Johnson on the job, they have also kept him from getting his salary; and along with him all other city workers have suffered. Inability to get a quorum present at council meetings—it taking four members for a quorum, and there being but six all told in the municipal executive body—has made it impossible to pass on the monthly accounts and authorize warrants for city pay.

In the meantime the three insurgents are holding out against the appointment of a water rent collector, and things in Gladstone are much up in the air. Members of the insurgent group in the council blame the mayor and the other three councilmen; and the mayor and his allies blame the insurgents. Relative to this matter the Courier has received the following letter:

Editor, Courier: We have noticed a misstatement of facts in last week's paper with regard to Gladstone's water superintendent. There is only one, and he is William Johnston, duly elected by the majority of the council and declared elected by the mayor. There was attempted a new set of water rules, and in them was a clause making a new office of "Water Collector" at ten dollars per month; but it was never adopted, it requiring an ordinance according to the charter, and no such ordinance has ever been read in the council. The collections by Johnston for February were \$219.50 and expenses including interest on bonds were \$209. Collections for March were \$266; expenses including interest on water bonds, \$203.75, leaving over \$60 to the good. The showing would be better if the mayor paid his water rent. This is the first time the water has paid expenses and left a surplus. We had over \$800 on the wrong side of the ledger last year. These are facts.
