To the Editor:

The city is competing with the farm for young people of Oregon. Unless farm life is made more interesting and attractive, the lure of the bright lights will continue to draw more and more of the boys and girls of our state away from the wholesome country into the sordid congestion of the metropolis.

To help make agriculture more interesting to young people, and farm life more attractive, there have been installed in many schools courses in agriculture, opening the mind to knowledge which transforms mere drudgery into enthusiasm.

Our Agricultural college, through its extension courses and the work of the county agriculturists, has been co-operating with the state superintendent of public instruction and the local school authorities to popularize scientific knowledge. While this educational work has resulted in better crops and more profits, that is less important than what it does for the young people.

This work is sustained by state appropriations. One of these appropriations has been cut out; the others are in jeopardy. The fathers and mothers of Oregon should make it known to their legislators that this work should not be sacrificed so long
