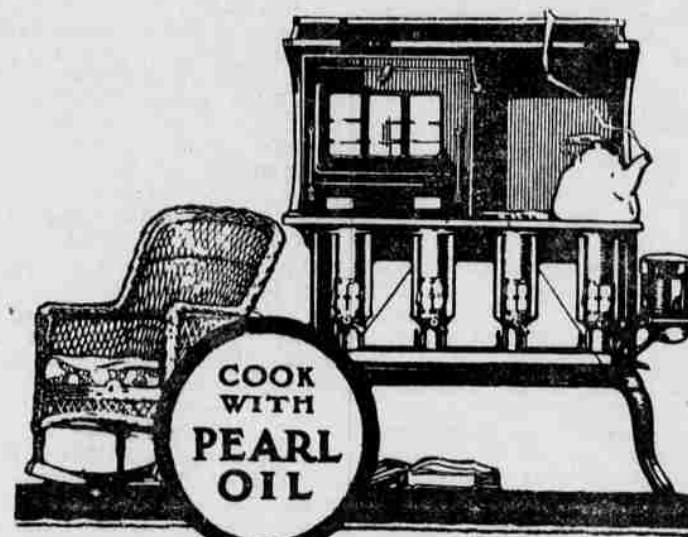
No frost all the spring here and the prospect for fruit is great. Cherries here look very good, as they were later in bloom than in the valley, where the long rains injured them very much.
