The Guernsey picnic was pulled off according to schedule. Dr. Walley presided at the meeting after a feast of good things to eat was enjoyed. There was an attendance of about 150 people. Among the speakers were Dr. Walley and Bob Fowler of Foot-hill farm, breeder of shorthorn Guernseys and sheep; Mr. Addis of the Oregon Farmer, also gave an interesting talk, as did Mr. Bogette of Hubbard. The latter is also a Guernsey breeder and creamery man. Judge Dimick gave one of his interesting talks on "Lost Opportunities." The Judge is a strong advocate of sheep husbandry. He has at the present time about 1000 head. He showed figures where he sold 200 lambs for which he received \$2500 at a net profit of \$10 per head. Mrs. Hughes gave the financial side of the game. They have paid out \$2300 for stock and have sold to date \$3400 worth, with six cows on hand valued at an average of \$500 each.

At the close of the meeting a Guernsey breeders' club was organized with a membership of 17 breeders. Mr. Richie of Boring is president and Mrs. Hughes Secretary and Treasurer. They will hold another meeting at the Bank of Commerce, Oregon City, September third to complete the organization and to provide funds for a carload shipment from Wisconsin. In the boys' judging contest Roy Smith carried off first, Kenneth Hughes second and Walter Funk third.

Some grain has been threshed. Enough to show that the oats will run as high as 30 bushels. Fall wheat runs from 20 to 25 bushels. L. Funk having 10 acres of prohi at 28
