

SPORTSMEN ASK BETTER FISH AND GAME RULES

Resolutions that will result in closer cooperation between the sportsmen of the state and fish and game commission and recommendations for the betterment of fish and game conditions were adopted during the third annual meeting of the

Oregon Sportsmen's league in Portland Monday. Delegates from all sections of the state were present and some of the questions brought up resulted in lively discussions. During the 11 months of this year the money collected from licenses totaled \$90,000. For 12 months in 1916 it was \$96,000, and 1915 the revenue was \$111,000. Facing this problem the fish and game

commission decided to cut down the number of paid deputy wardens and for this reason the league went on record as favoring closer cooperation between the sportsmen's club and the commission. The Willamette and Rogue river net fishing questions caused considerable discussion during the morning session. The invoking of a referendum against the law passed by

the legislature was a thorn in the sportsmen's side and plans will be mapped out by a committee of three to place the question squarely before the voters of the state before the next election. R. E. Clanton, master fish warden, made a short talk before the league and announced that 9,000,000 fish, mostly trout and steelheads, were distributed

throughout the state during this season. Among the Clackamas county sportsmen in attendance were Bert L. Jewell of Oregon City; E. W. Bartlett, Estacada; Lieutenant Langdon H. Spooner of Jennings Lodge and others. The Courier and The Oregon Farmer—both for \$1.00.
