PUBLIC HEALTH AND THE INFLUENZA

Since October an unprecedented plague of sickness and death has visited the United States, and the world. There have been worse visitations abroad, the Black Death of 1348 carrying away more than half the population of England. Fifty thousand corpses were interred in one burial ground in London. Cultivation of the fields was impossible, so farms lay fallow, and a pall hung over the entire land. In the reigns of the early Georges a great plague swept the lands of Europe. From time immemorial plagues have decimated the densely populated regions of the East. So our visitation is neither so new nor so unusual as to arouse special comment, except that America has been singularly free from such visitations in the past, and this comes as a reminder that we must pay the penalty of density of population in common with the older lands of the world.

Over three million people have already perished of the plague in India. Vegetarians seem to suffer more than meat eating nations, as one physician remarks. One fifth of the population of Papeete have perished. And in our own land probably three hundred thousand have died of the disease in three months. In Portland the death list runs up dangerously near to one thousand. Opinions are divided as to the extent to which the disease is contagious. But when strict quarantine is insisted on with such comparatively harmless diseases as measles and scarlet fever, does it not seem the part of wisdom to lock the stable even though the thief may not be around. It is certain that it spreads from one to the other, and that it is a crowd disease. One physician quarantines, and another is careless. The writer knows of one family in which there has been a seriously sick patient, yet no quarantine sign was on the house for days. It may not be yet, and the patient is nearly well. In another instance certain neighbors had all the symptoms which another physician ascribed to the "flu," (chills, fever, pains in the limbs, etc.) and for which he quarantined, but this physician said it was only a severe cold, and allowed the friends to see the patients. Almost the entire family of one group of relatives have come down with the genuine "flu" since then, and it looks as though they might have contracted it from the sick who were not quarantined. This is no time for good-natured dislike to bother people with the in-

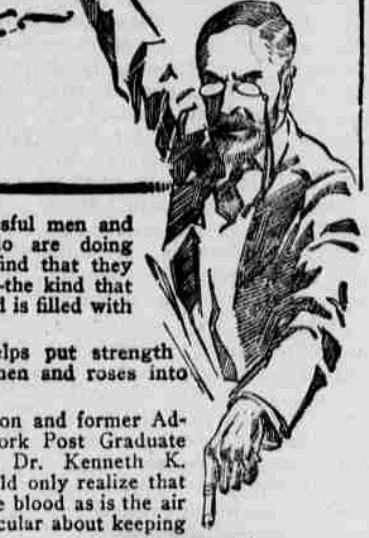
SPAGLE RETURNS HERE; WILL RESUME P. O. WORK

Lieutenant Spagle, for the past year stationed at the Presidio at San Francisco, where he enlisted as a training officer for recruits, has returned to Oregon City, arriving here Tuesday night. Lieutenant Spagle will resume his old job in the postoffice here. At one time, he claims that he came nearly being sent to Alaska as a training officer. 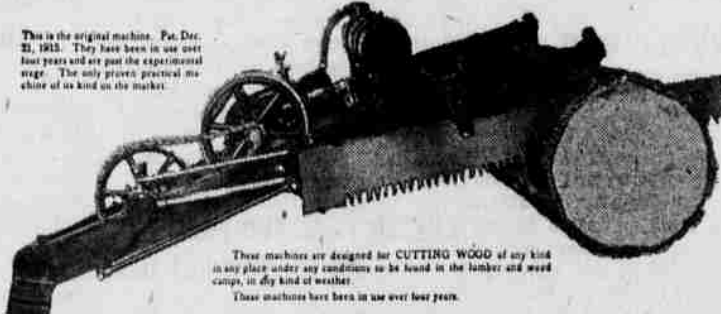
