To William David Wilkinson of Redwood Falls, Minnesota, Contestee:

You are hereby notified that Peter H. Sager, who gives Mulino, Clackamas County, Oregon, as his post-office address, did on March 17th, 1919, file in this office his duly corroborated application to contest and secure the cancellation of your Homestead Entry, Serial No. 05189, made August 1st, 1918, for SE 1/4 NE 1/4 and NE 1/4 SE 1/4 Section 11, Township 4 South, Range 2 East, Willamette Meridian, and as grounds for his contest he alleges that said entryman has wholly abandoned said land for six months last past; that he never established his residence thereon; that he has never cultivated or improved the same, nor has any one cultivated or improved the same for him; that his absence from said land was not due to his service as a private soldier, officer, seaman, marine, National Guardsman, or member of any other organization for offense or defense authorized by Congress during any war in which the United States may be engaged.

You are, therefore, further notified that the said allegations will be taken as confessed, and your said entry will be canceled without further right to be heard, either before this office or on appeal, if you fail to file in this office within twenty days after the FOURTH publication of this notice, as shown below, your answer, under oath, specifically responding to these allegations of contest, together with due proof that you have served a copy of your answer on the said contestant either in person or by registered mail.

GOVERNMENT HELPS STATES BUILD ROADS

Washington, D. C.—Federal aid to states in road building has resulted in the greatest era of highway construction the country has ever known.

From an experiment in 1916, when Congress appropriated \$75,000 to be used over a period of five years to aid states in road building, federal aid has developed into a magnificent certainty resulting in an appropriation of \$209,000,000 by the democratic sixty-fifth Congress. The appropriation is on a "fifty-fifty" basis; to receive federal aid, a state must appropriate an equal sum for the same purpose.

Under this plan, in March alone, 110 new projects were submitted involving an expenditure of \$17,558,410.07 for 1,268 miles of highway.

For this the government aid allotted is \$6,799,839.11, as many of the states are appropriating considerably more than the equal sum required to come within the provisions of the act.

Thirty-eight states are represented in this road building boom.

At one letting, Pennsylvania recently awarded contracts for the construction of highways exceeding \$2,000,000 in cost. Thirty-five thousand men will be employed on highway work in that state this year. If all the other states, many of which have just as extensive programs under way, employed men in equal proportions, it would mean that more than 600,000 would be employed on road work this year.

The war demonstrated the vital need of improved highways. Almost ninety per cent of all the automobiles in the world are running on the highways of the United States. Without them, it would not have been possible to handle the country's traffic during the war-time emergency; hence improvement of the country's roads is one of the greatest duties devolving upon the federal and state governments.

For the farmer, federal aid in road building means increased land values through the betterment of roads.

greater profits on his products through decreased cost of transportation; for the city man, it means a lower cost of living, greater facility of communication with the sources of supply, a reduction in the cost of transportation, and to the whole country a greater sense of security in times of national stress.

COUNTY AND CITY GO OVER TOP WITH "V" LOAN

Oregon City and Clackamas county are over the top with their quotas for the Victory loan drive, which closed Saturday. Although the banks here and in the county guaranteed the quotas, subscriptions from over the different districts have been coming in during the past week to such extent that the bank will only be compelled to carry \$75,000 of the loan. The quota for Clackamas county was \$400,900.

On top of the big subscription of Dr. Strickland of this city Friday, who subscribed \$10,000 to the loan, comes another larger subscription from G. R. Fields, superintendent of the P. R. L. & P. company, who subscribed to the amount of \$12,500. This makes Mr. Fields the largest individual subscriber in this county, and entitled to receive the prize offered by the loan committee for the largest subscriber. H. C. Stevens added another \$5,500 subscription to his already large holdings of the bonds, making a total amount of bonds held by him of \$10,500.

Ives vs. Ives
Frederick A. Ives entered suit for divorce here against his wife, Dorothy May Ives, charging in his complaint desertion. The couple was married November 11, at Vancouver. Plaintiff asks the court to allow him the custody of a minor child, and to give him absolute divorce on the above grounds.

New Trial Refused
In the case of J. W. Currin against the Crown Willamette Paper company for damages in the sum of \$1000, the supreme court refused motion for a new trial, asked by the company, and allowed the plaintiff \$1000 and costs. The mandate was received by the county clerk Tuesday.
