HOMEMAKERS' CONFERENCE WILL SOUND NEW SLOGAN

"Better homes for Oregon" is the new slogan around which the practical scientists and scientific practitioners of Oregon home-making will rally for their first separate conference at the state college, Corvallis, March 20-25.

"And the slogan will be made vital," say the leaders of the movement. "The opening address of Dean Ava B. Milam, 'Homemaking From a New Standpoint' will sound the keynote."

The conference has always heretofore been held in connection with Farmers' week, when some of the women thought they were expected to play "second fiddle" in the men's orchestra. In conformity with the development of a better standard of homes and homemaking, the method has been changed to meet the new needs.—O. A. C. Experiment station.

Grain Ration for Cows.

The most economical grain ration to feed dairy cows along with common home-grown roughage, is composed of corn, 300 pounds, mill run 240 pounds, and cotton seed meal, 100 pounds. Corn is relatively low in price now as compared with barley or oats. Cotton seed meal can be replaced by flax seed if succulent or laxative feeds are lacking in the ration.—O. A. C. Experiment station.

Poison the Field Mice.

Many berry growers are reporting trouble with mice that follow mole holes to the base of the plants or even make tunnels of their own. Both moles and mice can be discouraged by any system of cultivation that will tear out the ridge in the rows between the plants. With black raspberries, check cultivating will do this, but with trilled plants a grape hoe is best. Mice can be poisoned easily by mixing 1 ounce strychnine (alkaloid) one eighth ounce scaccaraine and 12 quarts oatmeal. Scatter it in holes or runways.—O. A. C. Experiment station.

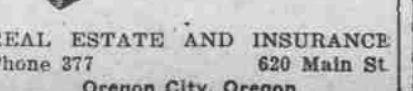

Twigs Carry Powdery Mildew.

The new outbreaks of powdery mildew at the start of each season arise from bud infections of the previous year. Pruning out mildewed twigs during the dormant period is a great aid in the control of the disease. For complete control this must be supplemented by spraying with lime sulfur. The first mildew spray is the same as for apple scab and is given just as the cluster buds open enough to expose the blossom buds. Later sprays are advised as for scab control—the pink, calyx and 15-day applications. Spring and summer cutting of mildewed twigs is also advised where the disease is troublesome.—O. A. C. Experiment station.
