



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

He is an inveterate story-teller, a quaint philosopher, and a man who has acpt right up-to-date in studying the big problems that confront America and the world. His philosophy of life is humorous and wholesome. At Chautauqua, the fourth aight, he will discuss "Human Nature and Politics," in his own, numitable style. Back in Chicago Mr. Read is the "grand old man" of the Unicago Press Club, a former president of that body, loved and admired by thousands of journalists and fellow-authors throughout the Middle West. He is the author of twenty-five books and innumerable magazine articles.
