Farm Reminders. Good wheat yields are one of the main factors in determining the cost of producing a bushel of wheat in Oregon's big wheat belt-and farmers have a big say in determining what the yield shall be. Good seed of the right variety, early summer fallow plowing and enough cultivation to keep the weeds down, early sowing of winter or spring varieties, seed treatment for smut control-these are the factors that have been proved by years of experiments at the Moro branch experiment station to favor a good bushel of wheat fell from \$2.34 in a Wills, deceased, and any and all per-14-bushel per acre yield to \$1.23 in a sons having claims against the said Experiment Station.

Time of plowing summer fallow has a big influence on yield of wheat in tratrix at the office of my attorney, Columbia basin dry farming, as shown in many years' trials at the Moro branch experiment station. plowed in April averaged 29.1 bushels per acre as against 27 bushels on May plowed, and 23 on June plowed tracts.

Depth of plowing on the Columbia basin dry farms is not important. The nine-year average yield on Moro station lands plowed ten inches deep over lands plowed five inches was only .9 bushel per acre. A slight variation of depth from year to year is recommended by D. E. Stephens, superintendent of the station.

Frequent cultivation of summer fallow lands sufficient to keep down the weeds and maintain a cloddy mulch produced an average of 31.9 bushels per acre for many years, while land ANNIE Z. RAPE FOR PIG PASTURE.

For early pasture, seed dwarf Essex rape as soon as possible in the spring, broadcasting at the rate of five pounds to the acre. Pasture is ready when the rape is a foot high and lasts phur. Common brimstone is used. A until hard freezing weather in the fall, (8-17-7t) if not grazed too closely.

Rape seeded early in May should the sulphur burn. Care must be taken furnish good pasture in late June or early July. Seedings for late summer and fall may be made until July. Rape seed is cheap, usually costing only 15 cents per pound or less. Furthermore, rape pasture has a larger carrying capacity than some crops, as it furnishes pasture for from 20 to 25 hogs per acre.
