DEHYDRATION AT HOME.

That delicious fresh flavor of fruits and vegetables may be retained throughout the year if they are cared for by the twentieth century process—dehydration.

Trays for drying can easily and cheaply be made at home. Hardware wire or screen may be used, or wooden slats and reeds make a light and clean tray.

The first process through which it goes is either sulfiting or steaming, to prevent oxidation. Sulfiting is the most common method for it is easier to handle the product on the trays and the sulfur is easily applied. It is done in an air tight box which can easily be made at home.

Slats should be nailed on the inside of the box three inches apart so that the trays can be slipped in one above the other in the base of the box and from crock or kettle, is placed to hold the sulphur. Common brimstone is used.

A slight opening in the base of the box is necessary to obtain air to make the sulphur burn. Care must be taken to see that it does not burn too quickly or become too hot. This process should be done out in the open air, and the product should be placed in the fumes as soon as possible to prevent any oxidation on the surface. The trays may be left in the box 15 to 25 minutes if dried rapidly.

It is more difficult to apply steam but a steam cooker can be used. A slight par boiled surface is formed by placing the product in the cooker, this preventing oxidation.

After vegetables are cleaned and sliced they should be dipped in boiling water for one or two minutes and par boiled, or they may be placed in the steam cooker and blanched.

In drying, the trays may be placed on racks, on top of the stove, or swung above. Heat, circulation, and humidity are necessary and must be considered in drying fruits and vegetables. If heated too hot and dry air is blown over the product, the surface becomes too hard for evaporation to take place readily from the rest of the slice.

By combining circulation of air, which tends to increase drying, with humidity, which tends to retard it, an equilibrium is reached and the result is a better tasting and a better refreshing product.

Air is circulated over and around the trays. A circulating fan may be placed in the window and the air blown over the drying materials, or the fan may be played above the stove and the hot air blown over the product which may be placed in the window.

Another method used by some, is to place the trays in a box which is open at two ends, through which air is forced by the use of the fan. This aids in hastening the drying process. The point to guard against is overheating. This causes case hardening and results in a poor tasting and poor refreshing fruit or vegetable.

A temperature of from 140 to 160 degrees Fahrenheit is the best for fruits and from 110 to 140 degrees for vegetables. The length of time required to dry a product varies according to the temperature, thickness of the product, amount of moisture in the product, and other conditions.

As soon as thoroughly dry, the products should be packed or stored in jars, tins, or crocks to prevent infestations. If set away from a light, a better color will be retained.

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since it is a comparison of hens that have had like opportunities. Housing, feeding, freedom from parasites and contagious diseases, and good management, should apply alike to all birds compared. When these conditions are poorly met even good layers may be culled out, especially at certain seasons when they are poor laying.—O. A. C. Extension Service.

Heavy fall and winter egg production may be expected only from early-hatched, well-matured pullets. No practical value comes from forcing hens into early summer molt to make of them good fall layers.—O. A. C. Extension Service.

For early pasture, seed dwarf Essex rape as soon as possible in the spring, broadcasting at the rate of five pounds to the acre. Pasture is ready when the rape is a foot high and lasts until hard freezing weather in the fall, if not grazed too closely.

Rape seeded early in May should furnish good pasture in late June or early July. Seedings for late summer and fall may be made until July. Rape seed is cheap, usually costing only 15 cents per pound or less. Furthermore, rape pasture has a larger carrying capacity than some crops, as it furnishes pasture for from 20 to 25 hogs per acre. Rape also furnishes excellent pasture for sheep, but care must be taken with sheep to avoid bloat.

Oats, peas and rape make a good combination and have been compounded with rape alone for a number of years. Each year the combination has given more profit after deducting the greater expense for seed and labor.

Seed this mixture at the usual time for oats, drilling a mixture of one bushel of oats and one bushel of field peas to the acre. Broadcast 5 pounds of dwarf Essex rape to the acre at the same time and harrow it in. Pasture is ready in June or when peas are well podded.

If not pastured too heavily, an acre of this will furnish grazing until a hard freeze for from 20 to 25 pigs. Unprofitable hens usually have combs with long, narrow serrations, which are hard and shrunken and covered with whitish scales. The eye is usually sunken and not prominently seen from the front, and has a dull, lusterless expression. The long beak and narrow, crow-like head are never found on high record hens.—O. A. C. Experiment countyB LandBRComb Extension Service.

While more active and nervous than a low producing hen, the high producer is more easily caught and handled. The high producer is friendly, while the shy layer is sly, stays on the roost or outer edge of flock, and squawks when caught. Hens first off the roost in the morning and last on at night are the birds that lay best of eggs.—O. A. C. Extension Service.
