How To Cure Hides.

ing essential points:

Take-off or Skinning. 1. Before killing clean off as much week it should be fed four or five times and during skinning keep from blood be supplied such as lawn clippings, letespecially.

throat lengthwise, never crosswise. 3. In skinning use the knife care two or three feeds of the mash daily fully and no more than is necessary. provided they have plenty of green Avoid cutting the hide or skin.

4. Make all ripping cuts with straight, smooth edges, not jagged ones.

5. Pay attention to the pattern of the hide and see that it is properly distributed among the shoulder, belly and butt sections.

6. Take off a hide or skin free from meat, sinews, bag, tail bone, horns,






