Grand Army Celebration at the Congregational Church Monday Night.

The celebration of the anniversary of the quarto cen. celebration of the G. A. R., by Meade Post No. 2, at the Congregational church, Monday night, was an immense success in every particular.

In the absence of Rev. O. W. Lucas, who was confined to his room with an attack of pneumonia, the opening ceremonies were conducted by Prof. Frank Rigler.

Rev. J. C. Read, who is a member of the post, made an appropriate address.

Mrs. M. W. Stratton, sang an appropriate solo, which was rendered in her usual happy style.

Prof. Frank Rigler, made a short address, more particularly directed to the children and young people, which was very appropriate to the occasion, and was followed by Rev. G. W. Giboney, who paid a glowing tribute to the late comrade, F. O. McCown, and made a short historical address.

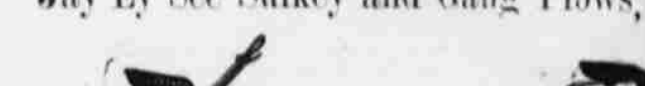
