A new sidewalk is being constructed from Seventh street, along the west side of John Quincy Adams to Eleventh. The walk has been completed by several of the property owners in front of their premises, and is six feet in width, and substantially constructed.

County Judge Meldrum requests that supervisors should certify to all bills presented by private individuals for supplies and materials furnished for road work and bridges. By thus doing it will save merchants who file bills for such supplies unnecessary delay.

The twenty-first and twenty-second monthly reports of the Oregon State Weather Bureau for December and January, have been received at this office. They were prepared under the direction of H. E. Hayes, master of the state grange, by B. S. Pague, of the U. S. Signal service department.

Mrs. D. W. Howard, of Canby, was in this city Saturday. He has three acres in strawberries, and fifty acres in other fruits. Mr. Howard is one of the leading fruit raisers of Clackamas county, and his efforts cannot fail to be successful, as the lands in the vicinity of Canby are peculiarly adapted to this industry.

A petition is being circulated among the property owners in the vicinity of Mount Pleasant, for a county road connecting the Beaver creek and New Era roads, also a county road starting from the center of the proposed road and terminating at or near the Mount Pleasant school house, so that this strip of land can be conveniently divided into small tracts.

Mr. H. W. Wesco, manager of the Northwest Real Estate and Investment Co., of Portland, was in Oregon City this week. He is one of the incorporators of a company organized to build an electric motor railway line from the end of the Fulton Park road to Oswego, and extend the same to Oregon City. Mr. Wesco was here to secure a right of way through the town of Oswego, from the county court.

The discovery was made Monday night by Sheriff Kelly and his deputies that a plan was matured for breaking the Multnomah county jail. Henry Moyatt, a United States prisoner appeared to be a leader of the attempt to escape. Moyatt resided in Oregon City last summer and fall, and was convicted of swindling about forty Albina workmen out of sums of \$25 to \$100 each by alleged timber speculations.
