New City Council

Three Meetings During the Past Week.

Pursuant to call there was a special meeting of the new council Friday evening, May 29. There were present T. W. Livan, mayor; L. L. Porter, recorder; E. H. Jones, marshal; Ross (Chairman), J. W. O'Connell, Frank Rigler, John Porter, James Wilkinson and J. W. Noble, councilman. Mayor Sullivan announced that the object of this meeting was to organize the council and fill vacancies as had occurred.

The recorder read a resolution from P. Randall councilman elect from the ward, who had previously handed his resignation, at a late hour during the afternoon, the mayor had not notified him that there would be a special meeting of the council, and after some discussion it was decided to postpone the business of the council until another meeting. The recorder also states that J. W. O'Connell, who had been elected recorder and collector, and who after his oath of office, declined to accept the office, had come forward this afternoon and filed the required bonds. On motion the council adjourned.

ANOTHER SPECIAL MEETING.

Mayor Sullivan called another meeting Monday evening June 3. All the newly elected councilmen were present. The mayor stated that the object of a meeting was to perfect the organization, and mentioned that the terms of some of the officers had expired by limitation, and that the first order of business would be the selection of a recorder. Councilman Ross Chairman made a motion that A. S. Dresser act as recorder pro tem; carried. The records of a council were demanded, but L. L. Porter positively refused to give them, and indignantly declined to open the door of the safe so that access could be had to the charter, or papers pertaining to the records of the council.

The mayor appointed Frank Rigler, as chairman and John G. Porter as a committee on membership and enrollment, who reported the following entitled to seats in the council: Ross chairman and C. D. Latourette from the ward; John G. Porter, Frank Rigler, John W. Noble and James Wilkinson of the second ward.

Protests were filed against J. W. O'Connell, as not being entitled to a seat in the council, for the reason that he was not a property holder, and T. P. Randall, as it was claimed that he did not reside in the city the length of time required for an elector, and furthermore, that he had resigned as a member of the council, and then revoked his resignation, without giving the council an opportunity to act thereon. On motion the council went into a committee of the whole, and first considered the qualifications of J. W. O'Connell. Mr. O'Connell stated that he held a deed to a certain lot in Oregon City. County Assessor Noble, and Chief Clerk Stevens, stated that he had given in no real property when they were making their returns, and Mayor G. E. Hayes said that he had examined the records in the recorder's office at the court house, and there was nothing to show that J. W. O'Connell owned any real property. Mr. O'Connell stated that he had purchased the property sometime in April, but had not had the deed recorded. Executive Porter testified that he had written and executed the deed, but did not remember the date. Mr. O'Connell stated Mr. Porter to go after the deed and bring it into the council, but he refused, saying that he was not going to run all over town after the deed. City Assessor J. E. Brown was called up, who stated that during the afternoon, he had examined Mr. O'Connell's \$250 on said lot.

On motion Mr. O'Connell was declared entitled to his seat, and his name ordered enrolled.

The council again went into a committee of the whole to discuss the qualifications of T. P. Randall as a member of the council. Mr. G. W. Church and other witnesses were called, who were admitted to a cross examination by Councilman Rigler. Mr. Randall testified that he had resided in the city for over one year previous to the election and that he had an object in establishing residence within the city limits. He also stated that he had been a member of the Oregon City Fire Department, and held an exempt firemen's certificate.

On motion Mr. Randall was declared entitled to his seat, and his name ordered enrolled.

Councilman O'Connell filed a protest against T. W. Sullivan holding the seat of mayor, which was declared out of order.

On motion the matter of the protest against Mayor T. W. Sullivan was indefinitely postponed.

The mayor announced that it was now in order to elect a president of the council. J. W. O'Connell and Frank Rigler were placed in nomination. O'Connell received three votes and Rigler five. On motion Mr. Rigler's election was made unanimous. Mr. Rigler in a few appropriate remarks thanked the members of the council, for the honor conferred on him, and trusted their future relations would be pleasant.

REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING.

Regular monthly meeting of the council held Wednesday evening, June 5, Mayor Sullivan in the chair, and all the members present.

Minutes of last special meeting read and corrected.

The following standing committees were appointed by the mayor:

Finance—Latourette, Rigler and Charman.

Streets and Public Property—Porter, Randall and Wilkinson.

Fire and Water—Latourette, Rigler and Porter.

Health and Police—Noble, Chairman and Wilkinson.

J. W. O'Connell was tendered a place on the health and police committee, but declined to accept.

A remonstrance was read from H. C. Stevens, Benjamin Jaggar and others against the improvement of Washington street between Fourth and Seventh. Referred to committee on streets and public property.

The opinion from H. E. Cross, city attorney was read, in reference to the right of the mayor to make the casting vote, on any question whenever a tie vote occurs in the council. The attorney decided that the mayor did have the right to cast such vote, and quoted numerous authorities in support of his opinion. On motion the opinion was filed.

Sidney Smith was appointed and confirmed city surveyor.

The mayor spoke of the importance of a fire chart.

C. D. Latourette suggested that a fire chart should be made for the city. W. H. Howell, supt. of water works, stated that the water commission was already preparing one. Mr. Latourette then suggested that the mayor act in connection with the water commission in preparing said chart, but T. F. Ryan arose to his feet and announced that the mayor or council had nothing to do with the water commission. The mayor then had the ordinance read, creating a water commission, for the benefit of the council.

Street Commissioner Hoberg announced that the bridge at the corner of Washington and Twelfth streets, was in a dangerous condition, and was ordered to repair the same under the direction of the street committee.

A protest was again filed against T. W. Sullivan holding the office of mayor. On motion of Frank Rigler the protest was laid on the table.

S. H. Green, city assessor, reported that he had not quite completed the assessment roll, and was allowed another day in which to complete his work.

On motion the recorder was directed to prepare notices of the meeting of the board of equalization and have the same published in the city papers.

On motion it was decided that when this council adjourns, that it adjourn until the evening of June 19th, to sit as a board of equalization.

C. D. Latourette urged the importance of establishing a sewerage system before pavements were laid down, and suggested that the committee on streets and public property in conjunction with the city surveyor examine and submit a plan of sewerage. Mr. Latourette favored progression, and advocated street improvements.

The mayor suggested several important measures, and he fills the chair with dignity, and is a good parliamentarian.

A special committee on printing was appointed consisting of Frank Rigler and C. D. Latourette to act in connection with the recorder in compiling and having printed 250 copies of the ordinances and charter.

T. P. Randall mentioned that there was considerable inquiry about the ordinance for grading seventh street, and stated that the ordinance had been read the first time and advertised, and thought it should be read a second time, but the recorder was unable to find the document.
