ANOTHER ACCIDENT FROM FIREARMS.

Amidst the reports: Mr. C. H. Christensen, of West Chealem, who was in town Sunday, gave us the particulars of an accident which happened the day previous to Fred, the fourth son of Chas. Small. Fred, with two or three other boys, was out in the woods with a gun, was standing upon a log, resting the rifle beside him on the butt, when it slipped off, the hammer striking the log and discharging the gun. The charge going across the chest, just grazing the skin and tearing away his clothes, striking the fleshy part of the left arm and the shoulder and inflicting an ugly wound. They were a mile away or so from home, and at once started to return, but Fred fainted from the effect of the wound before they had gone far. Two of the boys remained with him to see that he was taken care of, and the other went for help, so it was some time before he received surgical aid. Drs. Calbreth and Goucher have removed the arm and the patient's condition is a very critical one.

SOUTHERN OREGON SANDSTONE.

Sheldon Tidings: C. W. Ayers, of Seelye Stone Co., says the county has the contract to deliver about 1,000 worth of sandstone for the new court building in Portland, and that shipments will commence about the first of July. It is altogether likely, too, that the company will have the contract to furnish the stone for the new city hall in its construction is resumed. The price is well paid now and the quality of the stone demonstrated that no objection can be raised to it in that score, as was attempted when proposition to use it was first discussed by the city council.

A NATIVE SILK WORM.

Sydney Herald: Mr. C. B. Winn turned a very peculiar looking moth the other day, and being somewhat of a naturalist, he sent it to Prof. F. Washburn, entomologist at the State Agricultural College at Corvallis. It is a beautiful specimen, resembling in a full plumaged butterfly. The professor in acknowledging the receipt of the specimen said it was an American worm, leuca polyphenus, which is common enough in this country to be of economic value.
