TEACHING AS A PROPERSION.

An earnest effort is being made in many parts of the county to put teaching upon a professional basis. The subject has been discussed a great deal in the past, but really earnest work will be necessary to complete success. The question arises. What are the necessary qualifications of a professional teacher? A diploma from a normal school is generally recognized as the insignia of professional fellowship, but it is hardly the correct basis to judge from. A person may have a diploma and yet be a mere drone in the field of school work. What the state demands is earnest, energetic teachers-teachers who are ambitious to advance, and who will never lose an opportunity to assist in the general advancement of school work, not only in their own county and state, but in the whole nation if need be. The question is a national one, and should be earnestly agitated throughout the whole country. Upon the thoroughness of teaching depends the character of the nation.

There is need of earnest work in this line in Clackamas county. The right way is to advance step by step. The third grade teacher should feel like a bright pupil in the third reader-ambitious to be in the next class. A determination to advance, hearty co-operation among teachers, and a feeling of pride in school work will do much toward placing teaching upon a professional basis.
