OCTOBER WEATHER.

Western Oregon Has an Exceptionally Wet Month.

The month of October has been ex- J M Overholtzer and wife to John by a general uniformity of climatic con- \$125. ditions which have proved of decided value to agricultural and horticultural 1 acre and 50 rods \$133. interests throughout the Pacific slope. In California the general weather conditions have been especially favorable to the fruit industry. Throughout the month the centers of all cyclonic disturbances have passed eastward north 1 s r 3 e 20 acres \$1250. of Washington, a very notable change from the conditions which prevailed during October 1889 when the heaviest rains for a period of forty years occurred. There were only two storms during the month which carried their areas of precipitation southward into northern Cal. t1sr2e \$1000. ifornia. Fogs have been especially leavy along the entire coast for a conshlerable portion of the month.

RAINPALL

There has been a decided deficiency of precipitation throughout California, Arizona, Nevada, Utah, eastern Oregon Klatner n34 and n34 s14 nw34 s 31 t 4 s r eastern Washington, and partly in 2 e 123 acres \$1230, western Washington. The only region of excess was confined to western Oregon. The deficiency ranges from 12 1.43 at Port Angeles. The excess ranges TEMPLE No. 1. OREGON CITY PATRIAR: from .32 at Hoseburg to 1.06 at Pertland Clackamas Fruitland 3 acres \$600. and 1.05 at Tatoosh. Rain fell 18 days in California; 6 days in Nevada; none pt D L C Norhamiel Bell 40 acres \$500. in Arizona; 23 days in Oregon and 24 ANDRES HOPER LODGE, No. 8, HONS OF days in Washington. The heaviest rainfalls in 24 hours occurred as follows; Helena, 12th, 1.58 inches; Tatooch 15th 96; 22nd, 1.45; Fort Canby, 22nd, 1.01; Portland 24th, 1.40.

TEMPERATURE.

It has been above the normal in all 163.97 acres \$5000. districts from Mexico to British Columbia but the excess is not generally very \$187. great It was greatest in Arizona, western Oregon, eastern Washington, and southwestern California, within which regions the excess ranged from I Clackamas Heights \$65. 5 to 8 degrees. Without more frequent and long continued areas of high barometric pressures over the North Pacific region the temperatures in October will remain above the normal. The more frequent the storm areas over this region the greater the excess of temperature for the Pacific slope. The highest temperatures were confined to the first week of the month. The heaviest frosts were confined to the first half of the month Candies, Nuts, Notions, Etc. and were most severe and general on the 2nd, 3rd, 12th, and 13th. ----
