

THE COUNCIL MEETS

THE USUAL CRIST OF BUSINESS TURNED OUT.

A Fresh Cow Ordinance Introduced. Monthly Bills Audited—Streets and Sidewalks.

At Wednesday night's council meeting the city engineer was instructed to survey and establish a grade on John Adams street between Seventh and Eleventh. A new ordinance granting the franchise now held by the Oregon City Electric company to the Willamette Falls Electric company, with enlarged powers, was referred to the committee on streets and public property. The street superintendent's report respecting the Dr. Ross sidewalk was ordered filed, though Latourette thought it unjust that a citizen should be put to an expense of \$27 when \$2 applied in a different way would have remedied the difficulty. Cochrane agreed with him but O'Connell wanted the ordinance technically observed or it could not be enforced he wanted to know it. The following bills were allowed:

After recess the treasurer's monthly report was read and filed. Then Chairman Porter of the committee on streets and public property made a verbal report on the petitions for electric lights at Twelfth and Madison, and Jefferson and Ninth. The committee made no recommendations. However the council took the matter up and it appeared to be conceded by all there should be a light at Jefferson and Ninth and a motion was made to have one there. An amendment adding the light at Madison and Twelfth brought out a difference of opinion as to the necessity for such light though the amendment prevailed. Queerly enough it proved to ride the original motion to death in a parliamentary tangle. Chairman, O'Connell, Cochran and Latourette voted aye, and Radford, Porter, Wilkinson and Noble no, leaving the casting vote to the mayor who voted in the negative. Then O'Connell disputed the right of the mayor to vote at all but that official ruled that he had the right.

Action in reference to the renovation of the city jail was approved with the understanding that the cost would be charged against the rent paid for that institution. The old ordinance restraining animals and fowls from running at large in the city was read. On motion of Latourette it was made to include the whole city and the date when it should take effect was also changed from March 1 to April 1. Then it was ordered published without a dissenting vote.

The chief of police was instructed to make arrangements for a place to impound cattle. The proposition of T. A. McBride to pay \$1400 for the two lots on Seventh street adjoining his residence property was accepted.

Wilkinson moved to have a six-foot sidewalk on the north side of Eleventh from Fred Palmer's corner to Jackson. Then an amendment to include a walk on the east side of John Adams street from Seventh to Eleventh was proposed. Another parliamentary jumble resulted and when the measure finally carried it appeared to authorize a sidewalk from Mrs. Whitlock's corner on the north side of Eleventh to John Adams and on the east side of the latter to Seventh. At one time during the contention most of the councilmen were on their feet at once endeavoring to be heard. O'Connell's motion to postpone was lost on a division of the house as was also his motion to adjourn. Then he asked to be excused and put on his coat and hat remarking that he did not propose to stay there all night "jangling like a lot of school boys". However, he was coaxed back to his seat in time to vote against the motion with Noble and Cochran—Randall, Charman, Latourette, Porter and Wilkinson voting aye. An adjournment was taken till next Monday night.

OUR GLORIOUS CLIMATE—Mr. E. Warner of the ESTERHISE has red raspberries now ripening in his garden in Mountain View. These berries are on shoots that came up this year. After making the growth which nature deemed proper for the season the weather was still so inviting that the young shoots put forth blossoms and they are maturing a very decent crop of berries. The fruit is not stunted and insipid as might be expected of December berries. It is of large size, juicy and of excellent flavor. What the effect will be as regards the productiveness of the bushes next year remains to be seen.

A young child of Mr. and Mrs. Garwood died last Tuesday and was buried from the Catholic church Wednesday morning. The child was about four weeks of age.
