THE COURT MEETS.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE REGULAR MONTHLY TERM.

Several Road Matters Pass Muster, Some Others do Not—The Election Booths.

At the regular monthly session of the county commissioners held last week the report of the viewers, and field notes and plat together with the expense account of \$40, and petitions for damages by T. W. Duffy and Karl Studeman in the Moehnke and Howard mill road matter were filed. The report was approved and expenses ordered paid and Floyd Kirk, Robert Conner and William Owens appointed to appraise damages to meet at Mink postoffice at 10 a. m. December 19.

In the matter of the Good bridge and Canby road the report of the viewers, with field notes and plat and expense bill of \$24.30 were filed; also petition of J. Hart for damages. Report approved, expense account ordered paid and S. F. Mark, D. H. Harms and Henry Smith appointed to appraise damages, to meet at the Good bridge at 10 a. m. Dec. 19.

The report of viewers on the private road of public easement of Andrew Weise was filed, and all expenses having been paid by the petitioner, it was ordered that the road be opened.

The report of the viewers with field notes etc. on the Price Fuller road was filed and approved and the expense bill of \$22.10 audited.

In the matter of the Oswego and county line road the report of the viewers recommended that the road be not established until the petitioners build a bridge across Tryon creek without expense to the county. The expense account of \$15.30 was ordered paid.

It was also decided not to establish the N. O. Waldon road and the expense of \$22.50 was paid by petitioners.

The petition of E. Parker et al for a county road was denied because it was defective in that the notice was not signed by all the petitioners.

The petition for a change in the county road from Rock creek bridge to Damascus was denied because of defective description of the part of the old road proposed to be vacated.

The county surveyor was ordered to survey and James Marquam, I. S. Scott, and Marion Sampson to view the road petitioned for by Robert Thompson et al. The viewers are to meet at the place of beginning Dec. 22.

The report of C. Moehnke on the Milk creek bridge was approved and a warrant of \$280 ordered issued to I. S. Scott in full payment for the same.

The proposition of the Portland Water company for a bridge across the Sandy was declined. The judgment of the court was that the present need to the public of a bridge across the Sandy would not justify an expenditure on the part of the county to build said bridge of more than forty per cent of its cost.

The petition of J. M. Jones et al for a county road was denied because it was defective in that not all the petitioners signed the notice.

In the matter of receiving bids for election booths in Clackamas county, bids were submitted by The Oregon City Sash & Door company, Geo. D. Barnard & Co., Joseph & Henry Jones, Howell & May, J. H. Bestow and G. R. H. Miller. The two latter had no guarantee deposit as required. Upon due consideration the contract for furnishing thirty-six complete steel booths and seventy-nine steel annexes was awarded to Geo. D. Barnard & Co. for \$841 the booths to be delivered in Oregon City.

County Assessor Noble was appointed to attend the state board of equalization to look after the interests of this county before that board.

Commissioner Moehnke was instructed to have done at once work to protect the county road between Meadow Brook and Union Mills from erosion.

Commissioner Bair was paid \$11 and Commissioner Moehnke \$30.40, mileage and per diem fees.
