Washington Newslets.

The comptroller of the currency has appointed Frederick N. Panly, of Los Angeles, receiver of the California National bank of San Diego.

At the meeting last Friday evening it was decided to postpone the visit of congress to Chicago to inspect the work upon the world's fair until some time in February next.

The treasury department last Friday purchased 775,000 ounces of silver at prices ranging from \$0.95.6 to \$0.95.7 per ounce. The offers were 1,013,000 ounces. No more silver will be purchased this month.

Wallawa Chieftain: At a meeting of the Umattilla Alliance held at Milton last week, a resolution was adopted declaring it to be a fraternal, not a political organization, and opposing a third party movement. A CITIZEN WANTS TO KNOW.

Councilmen Latourette and Charman Called on to Resign.

To the Editor: In your report of city council proceedings in last week's issue of the ENTERPRISE, I notice that Councilman Latourette was decidedly opposed to the employment of other counsel to aid Attorney Cross in defending the city against the Seventh street malcontents. For pure, unadulterated gall Mr. Latourette is entitled to the entireakeshop. He is retained against the city on a contingent fee, and takes advantage of his position as member of the council to cripple the city in her defense, and opposes the employment of additional counsel on the ground (ostensibly) of economy. The gentleman is too modest by half. Why did he not proffer and push through a proposition for the city to confess judgment and vote him an additional fee for the very honorable course he is pursuing as councilman?

The amazing part of the business is that neither the mayor nor any other member of the council rose in his place and administered the censure Mr. Latourette so richly deserved. Surely they must all have been asleep.

But let us look into this Seventh street business just a little. The new charter went into effect (according to the allegation of the complaint) last May. About that time Messrs. Latourette, Charman and the other members of the council were elected, and I suppose that before entering on their duties Messrs. Latourette, Charman and the others were sworn in. That is, each of them held up his right hand and swore to perform the duties of councilman to the best of his ability, and (substantially) to protect the city against all comers.

At this time only the preliminary steps had been taken in the matter of improving Seventh street. No bids had been advertised for, no contract let, and no ground broken. All this was done subsequent to the organization of the present council.

Now where was Councilman Latourette during the time the council was taking the illegal steps alleged in the complaint he has caused to be filed against the city? Why did he not see to it that he was not a party in the irregular or illegal steps he alleges? Why did he not lift his voice in warning? Why did he not utter some protest? Echo answers that during all that time he was conniving with others to bring suit against the city whose interests he had sworn to protect. In all this he has brought deserved criticism on himself and cannot escape censure; and, still more, he has grievously disappointed his friends. He should resign his office at once and not embarrass the city in her defense against the suit he has engineered.

We cannot close this without bestowing some criticism on Councilman Charman. He was one of the petitioners for the improvement of Seventh street, and voted for the same; and now swears to the "complaint" as drawn by Mr. Latourette. But it does not seem to have occurred to him that he too should resign. Verily some things are hard to comprehend.
