THE COUNTY COURT.

THE JUDGES AND CLERKS OF ELECTION ARE APPOINTED.

New Election Precincts Defined—The Customary Road Matters—Grist of Bills Allowed.

At the regular January term of the county commissioners' court M. Robbins, S. R. Taylor and J. W. Elliott were appointed appraisers of damages in the matter of the Robert Thompson road, to meet at the point of beginning January 18.

The Goodbridge and Canby road was ordered established. Damages to the amount of \$40 and expenses \$8 were ordered paid.

In the matter of the petition of John Forsythe and others for a county road the petition was granted and County Surveyor Smyth was instructed to survey and C. C. Babcock, G. W. Church, Hiram Straight, jr. appointed viewers to meet at Park Place, January 18.

The supervisor of road district No. 9 was instructed to build the bridge petitioned for by T. G. Jansrud and others, the same to cost \$50.

W. L. Brown was granted until February 4 to complete the bridge improvement at the waterway in Milwaukie.

The sheriff was directed to keep a book in which he will enter at time of discovery all errors, double assessments, etc., for which he claims credit on settlement with the court.

Frank Ford declined to be supervisor of road district No. 26 and C. C. Borland was appointed in his stead; John Talbert declined in district No. 3 and J. W. Roots was appointed; Samuel Woller declined in district No. 64 and R. W. Zimmerman was appointed.

It was ordered that the tax levy for this year be as follows:

Death of a Prominent Iowa Editor.

To the Editor: The Davenport (Iowa) Democrat of December 20 brings news of the death of Edward Russell who died at Minneapolis on the morning of the 19th. A brother of the deceased, Mr. William Russell, is a resident of Oregon City, and there are quite a number of former residents of Iowa, now citizens of Clackamas county, who would be interested in reading a short sketch of his life and work.

Edward Russell was born of Scotch parentage in London, England, October 6, 1830. He came to this country with his parents, when he was fifteen years of age. He became at the age of eighteen an Iowa correspondent of the National Era, of Washington City, the paper in which was first published Mrs. Stowe's "Uncle Tom's Cabin." In 1862 he became one of the proprietors and editor-in-chief of the Davenport Daily Gazette, one of the most influential journals at that time in the great West, and under Mr. Russell's management it became an able and fearless champion of the justice of the cause of the government and a bulwark of strength to the enemies of slavery and disunion. He was a power in Iowa republican politics for many years, and there were few if any in that state who wielded a greater influence than he did. up to the time he relinquished control of the Gazette. Mr. Russell was nineteen years editor of the Gazette and postmaster of the city of Davenport seventeen years. His first commission as postmaster was signed by Abraham Lincoln. He was dismissed from the office by Andrew Johnson, and restored to the position by President Grant. His vigorous warfare on Johnson's reconstruction policy was more than that functional could endure, and hence Mr. Russell was the first to be punished by him with a removal from office for a political offense.
