THE GOLDEN GIANT.—The presentation of the western drama "The Golden Giant" at the opening of Shively's new theatre last Saturday night by French's company of Portland was a success. The theatre was crowded to the doors. There was room for appropriately staging the piece which required considerable special scenery and the company put it on in good shape. Some scenes in Idaho mining life were depicted in rather realistic fashion. Mr. French as Jack Mason made a success of the character of the gambler, who is after all rooted, away down in good principles, and Eya Earl French was a charming Bessie Fairfax. Annie Firmin was the woman in distress pursued by three or four villains and she carried the part well. The huge frame of John Jack, which does not fit many pieces, made him an admirable rough diamond, Alexander Fairfax, of the Golden Giant mine. The other characters were skillfully sustained throughout. The Willamette Cornet band rendered music for the occasion. In a short speech before the curtain Mr. Jack congratulated the people of Oregon City on the possession of so fine a theater and promised other attractions to be brought here from French's theater.

COMMISSIONER MOENKE'S POSITION.—In the last issue of the ENTERPRISE the statement was made that the commissioners of the county court were understood to favor the route for a county road to Molalla as suggested by Judge Meldrum. Commissioner Moenke however does not feel satisfied with the route running west of the present county road and takes the ground that no route should be selected until after a careful and complete survey and says that the court ought not to adopt any survey and make a road to Molalla in the present state of the county finances without receiving liberal subscriptions from parties directly interested.

THE COUNTY ROAD MATTER.—There will be a special meeting of the board of trade to consider the report of the committee having charge of the Molalla road matter next Monday night. The committee held a meeting at Captain Apperson's office last Tuesday and took over the matter of the report but it will not be public till presented to the board. It will probably indicate the necessity for a full and accurate survey of different routes before selecting any.

ANOTHER PIONEER GONE.—Benjamin Cleaver, one of Oregon's most respected pioneers, died at his home in Lebanon Friday, January 8. He came to Oregon in 1839 and settled on a donation claim near Oregon City. He was born in Kentucky in the year 1801, and was hence over 90 years old at the time of his death. Mr. Cleaver was an honored citizen and had a host of friends in the Willamette valley.

PROBATE MATTERS.

Recent Estates Brought Before the County Court.

Letters of administration on the estate of William I. Lucas having been issued to Wolfgang Baumann, and application having been made for the appointment of persons to appraise the estate, Ed. Carter, A. W. Sawtell and John Stewart were appointed such appraisers.

The will of John M. Drake, who died at Silverton on December 21, aged 72 years, a resident of Clackamas county, leaving an estate of a probable value of \$6000, was admitted to probate. No general administration of the estate was deemed necessary.

Letters of administration on the estate of Owen P. Owens, who was killed at Oswego December 21, leaving an estate valued at \$300, were issued to R. D. Price. Thomas Charman was appointed administrator of the estate of Alexander McGarvey who died last September, leaving an estate valued at \$4,000.

The last will and testament of Charles A. Moenke was admitted to probate. He left real estate of the estimated value of \$1000 devised to the members of his family. It was ordered that muniment of title vest in the heirs named in the will but it was not deemed necessary that there be a general administration of the estate.
