A man who has been doing similar work in other counties offers to do the work here for \$1500 and a share of the money the county will gain by reason of his discoveries. Mr. Thorne will do the whole thing complete for \$5000 and he claims his system the only one adopted to use in a county in which there are donation land claims.
