The smelt season is at its height, and those delicious little fish are now as cheap as ever they get. They are swarming in the Cowlitz, which seems to be their headquarters, and already the gulls and loons have gone there to soar and scream and gorge themselves on the smelt that every bare spot of bank leaves exposed.

It is said that the desert lands in the Yakima valley, which belong to the railroad company, but which are covered by the big ditch now being constructed are held at \$45 per acre. A rebate of \$5 per given, however, if the land is cultivated the first year. The land throughout the entire valley will be equally valuable as soon as water is put upon it.

The headgate of the Columbia Valley Land and Irrigation company's canal is now completed, and everything is about ready to turn on the water, which will be used this summer to irrigate a large amount of sandy soil along the Umatilla river. The headgate is solid and substantial, constructed from heavy timber, some 25,000 feet of lumber being required. It is built on the bedrock, the foundation being secured with concrete.
