THE PRIMARY ELECTION.—The republican primary election in the Oregon City precincts last Saturday brought out about the usual primary vote. There was no very sharp contest though there were two tickets in the field in each precinct.

FOR SCHOOL DISTRICT DIVISION.—Years ago when Samuel Kennedy was the owner of the old James Winston donation land claim beyond the Abernethy and his was the only family in that locality, Oregon City school district No. 62, was made to include a long strip of country so as to give Mr. Kennedy's children school privileges in town.

SUIT FOR DIVORCE.—The complaint in a suit for divorce was filed with the county clerk Monday by Attorney Brownell for Mrs. Charlotte I. Worsham. The complaint sets forth that Thomas P. Worsham and Charlotte I. Worsham were married July 30, 1879 in Oregon City, but that since that time the husband has failed to support, and has subjected the wife to cruel and inhuman treatment and on one occasion he attempted to shoot her.

RAILROAD LAND CASES.—While the Northern Pacific company had the first land grant in this country the one subsequently made to the Oregon & California company was patented first. It afterward developed that the Oregon & California and Northern Pacific grants overlapped each other in the northern part of the Willamette valley.

however, took another view of the matter, holding that when the Northern Pacific grant was forfeited the land reverted to the government and not to the Oregon & California, company even though it did have the patent. Last May Mr. Burney sent a communication to the interior department requesting the cancellation of the Oregon & California's patent to certain lands in the doubly granted tract.

RIVER TRANSPORTATION BUSINESS.—The steamer Bentley was added to the upper river fleet last week by the Oregon Pacific, giving the company two steamers on the river now, the other one being the Hoag. The Elwood and the Madoc are still running. Freight is moving freely and all the boats are carrying full loads.

CHANGE OF BUSINESS.—A Rose has sold his postoffice store to G. W. Rich, who took possession of the establishment this week. Mr. Rich has gone out of the crockery business and the space occupied by his stock will be used by Miss Wilkinson with millinery and dressmaking.

STAGE OF THE RIVER.—The highest water in the Willamette below the falls this year during the month of February was on the 1st of the month when it marked 8.2 feet above zero. In 1891 the water was the highest on the 15th, 11.2 feet. It was the lowest this February on the 10th, 4.6 feet, and in 1891 on the 6th, 4.2 feet.

ARRESTED FOR BURGLARY.—Bob Gardner and Bert Bacon were arrested and examined before Justice Fouts Tuesday charged with entering the residence of Mrs. Eva Newman on Sixth street with intent to commit a felony last Sunday night. It was alleged that they had made an attempt to assault a daughter of Mrs. Newman but had been frightened away.

PAPER MILL IMPROVEMENTS.—The Willamette Pulp & Paper company has nearly finished an addition to its paper mill and will soon have in operation another paper machine larger than the present one so that the capacity of the mill will be more than doubled. This will make an important addition to the output of manufactures from Oregon City.

FRANCIS MURPHY MEETINGS.—Francis Murphy, the celebrated temperance worker, closed a week's work in Oregon City Wednesday night. Beginning Thursday of last week every evening he held a gospel temperance meeting in the Congregational church and the house was packed at every meeting.
