Home Bats for Scotland.

LONDON, March 19.—All liberal members from Scotland and many English members, including some conservatives, approve the bill introduced in parliament today for the creation of a Scottish legislative body. The bill will attract general attention, owing to its similarity to the Irish question. The bill establishes in Scotland a legislature, consisting of the queen and a Scotch legislative body, to enact laws for Scotland, with the exception of matters relating to the imperial administration; the legislature to be prohibited from establishing religion imposing disabilities, or conferring privileges on such account.

Chicago Roadless.

CHICAGO, March 19.—The Tribune gives a list of the alleged hoodlum transactions by the city council. It includes \$200,000 for the Northern Pacific franchise, \$150,000 for Economic gas ordinance, \$130,000 for Compressed Air company, the franchise including a number of smaller amounts for other franchises.

Sailing Vessels for the North.

VICTORIA, B. C., Mar 19.—The schooner Benda, the first of the Nova Scotia sealers, arrived today, 130 days from Sydney, and will be at once fitted out for the north. She will take white hunters and sail as soon as possible north. The Upton liner Zambesi arrived this morning, twenty-two days from Kobe. She has three cabin passengers, thirty-two Japanese and sixty-two Chinese for Victoria, and seven Chinese and 100 tons of freight for Portland.
