

Another Pioneer Gone.

Mrs. Rebecca Buckner died at her son's home in Highland, March 26th, 1892, aged seventy-two years and two months. She was born in Tennessee, January 24th, 1820 and was married to Colman Buckner, January 17, 1837. She survived her husband two years and seven months. She was the mother of fourteen children, five of whom survive her—Mrs. Joseph Walton of Oregon City, Mrs. Lou Paquet of Portland, Mrs. Wm. Wallace of Mulino, Mr. Bary and Wm. Buckner of Mink and Clarkes post office, respectively. Mrs. Buckner united with the Christian church in 1868. Mr. and Mrs. Buckner came from Missouri to Oregon in 1852 and settled on a donation claim the following February upon the creek which bears their name in this county. Mrs. Buckner spun and wove all the flannels the family wore for many years.

COUNTY TEACHERS.

MONTHLY MEETING OF THE ASSOCIATION AT OSWEGO.

A Large Attendance at the Meeting and an Interesting Program Successfully Carried Out.

Quite a number of teachers from Oregon City and other points took the 9:30 boat Saturday, March 26, for Oswego. As the Altona did not land there she transferred the teachers to the Ramona which landed them. A number of teachers having arrived from the northern portion of the county, Superintendent Thompson called the association to order at 10:30, about thirty teachers being present. Among them were noted the following: Miss H. M. Wetherell, Miss Bitner, Miss Fannie Porter, Miss Heinbothem, Miss Ross, Miss Ina Thomas, Miss Aggie Beattie, Miss Norma Fox, Miss Mullen, Miss Anna Young, Mrs. Thompson, Messrs. Evans, C. Y. Draper, P. M. Weddell, G. H. Dunn, E. M. Rands, Prof. W. H. Dobyms of Albina, Superintendent Thompson and many whose names were unknown to your correspondent.

The names of Miss M. A. Harrison of West Oregon City, Miss Mary Bickner of Oswego, Mr. Watt and Mr. L. T. Anderson were proposed and received into membership by unanimous vote.

The Oswego school then sang a beautiful song entitled "The Ash Grove."

C. E. Pease being absent Mr. Weddell began the discussion on opening exercises in our schools and he was followed by Miss Beattie, Prof. Dobyms, Miss Rose, C. Y. Draper and others, after which the Oswego school rendered the old song "John Brown" with much effect.

Miss Donaldson being absent G. H. Dunn opened the discussion on methods of teaching geography, favoring outdoor moulding in fine weather. Miss Mullen and Prof. Evans gave their methods. E. M. Rands thought ladies excelled in teaching geography and C. Y. Draper believed we should draw largely upon the pupil's imagination. The subject of discipline was postponed till the arrival of Prof. Strange and the next place of meeting was considered and Oregon City selected.

A committee on program was then appointed consisting of C. Y. Draper, E. M. Rands and Miss Rose.

After recess Miss Perry entertained the association with music and P. M. Weddell read an able paper on the relation of parents to the school after which the association adjourned to dinner. The teachers were conducted into an adjoining room where a grand collation awaited them, which had been prepared by the hospitable people of Oswego, and it was indeed a sumptuous repast, the table being loaded with all the delicacies. In the center of the table was a large cake on which the words "school cake" appeared in large letters. This cake was a product of Mrs. Webb's skill. During the dinner hour the Oswego school sang several songs which lent additional enchantment to the banquet. The association then re-assembled and were entertained by a musical program from the Oswego school ending with "Just before the Battle, Mother."

The names of Miss Norma Fox and Mr. McHeart were then proposed for membership and duly elected. Prof. Strange, having arrived, gave an able discourse on discipline, emphasizing the fact that children love and respect power in a teacher. Superintendent Thompson then gave an address and it being necessary for him to retire in order to reach home, Vice-President Strange took the chair.

Prof. Steele, late school superintendent from North Dakota, was introduced and he made an address, dwelling particularly upon teachers' salaries. He believed that \$50 per month should be the minimum price. A teacher who was not capable of earning that was not capable of teaching.

E. M. Rands read an interesting paper on physiology and the subject was discussed by Messrs. Draper, Evans, Pease, Dobyms and Dunn, the general opinion being that physiology was becoming one of the most interesting branches in the common school course.

Mr. Winches being absent and Mr. Pease having arrived the latter opened the discussion on the subject of indifferent pupils, followed by Mr. Steele. The chair then called for the best method of dealing with indifferent pupils, to be expressed in one sentence, and various responses were given such as "shake them," "praise them," "interest them," "use the hazel," "ridicule them," etc, but all concluded Miss Fanny Porter struck the nail squarely on the head when she uttered the one word "taffy."

The Misses Molen favored the association with a duet after which the committee reported the following program for the next meeting:
