Circuit Court Cases.

Complaint was filed Tuesday in a case wherein Jenning & Weber are plaintiffs and John Conway defendant. The suit is on a mechanic's lien to obtain \$500 alleged to be due on a contract for erecting a dwelling house for defendant in Oswego.

T. R. Worthington and wife are plaintiffs in a suit against Henry Thiesing for the recovery of the possession of a piece of land from which plaintiffs were ousted in 1888. Damages in the sum of \$500 are also claimed. L. L. Porter is attorney for the plaintiff.

Henry Chapman, through Miller & Miller of Portland has begun suit against Charles D. and Nellie M. Mercer and Filaney and Daniel Otis for the foreclosure of a mortgage securing the payment of a note for \$7200.

C. D. & D. C. Latourette filed a mechanic's lien for G. B. Birehard against S. J. Oglesby and J. Cole for \$51.26 for labor and materials in building a dwelling house for defendant.

Other suits filed were J. C. Hackett vs. Marion Phillips, foreclosure of mortgage; Bank of Oregon City vs. J. S. Cochrane, also foreclosure; Coffin & McFarland vs. J. B. Jackson.

Died.

SAFFARRINS.—At the residence of her daughter, Mrs. Frank Patton, in Astoria Wednesday March 30, 1892, Mrs. Almira Saffarrins, aged sixty-five years. Mrs. Saffarrins' maiden name was Almira Dey. She was born at Fort Edward, N. Y. May 6, 1826. She came to Oregon in 1845 and lived in Oregon City until ten years ago, since which time she has lived in Portland, Newberg and Astoria. Her husband, Dr. Henry Saffarrin died twenty years ago. Their surviving children are Mrs. Frank Patton and Mrs. Eugene Dement of Astoria and Mrs. J. B. David and Mrs. E. S. O'Bryan Newberg. The funeral service was held in this city Saturday morning and was conducted by Mrs. Edwards of the Friend's church at Newberg. The burial was in Mountain View cemetery.

THE COMMON COUNCIL.

Business Transacted at the Regular Meeting for April.

Councilman Noble was absent from Wednesday night's council meeting. A petition containing forty names for the appointment of William Took as sexton of the cemetery was declared out of order because no vacancy existed. A petition for the appointment of a night watchman for the district east of High street was denied, because the financial condition of the city would not warrant incurring more expense for police protection. Replying to a question by Latourette the chief of police said there had been times when two night watchmen were needed down town. The advisability of having more policemen for service both above and below the bluff was admitted but it was deemed best not to increase the expense of that department of the city government at this time. The petition of the proprietor of the Oriental hotel for the continuation of his liquor license, which expires on the 8th was granted.

The report of the retiring chief engineer of the fire department, M. H. Flauggan, was read and ordered filed. It showed that Fountain Hose company No. 1 had 800 feet and Cataract hose company No. 2, 850 feet of good hose with fixtures and appliances for handling and working the same. The Hook & Ladder company has a truck and six ladders in serviceable order. There are seventeen hydrants and they have been painted and numbered. During the past year there were only two fires—one at Ed. Warren's furniture store causing a loss of \$200 and one at Thos. Miller's residence causing a loss of \$25.

The following bills were reported by the finance committee and ordered paid: Willamette Falls Electric Co., \$128.03. Walling & Jarrish, trees, 10.50. J. S. Purdom, policeman, 77.50. John Kelly, policeman, 65.00. L. L. Porter, recorder, 32.50. C. Hoberg, street superintendent, 54.00. Mrs. Sasson, prisoner's board, 10.65. E. Matthias, labor, 13.00. Hook and Ladder Co., 25.00. Fountain Hose Co., 25.00. M. Quinn, pt. hyds., 11.25. Charles Bolds, jail rent, 8.00. Fireman Election Judges, 7.50.

Collector S. R. Green's bill of \$127.93, which had been laid over two months, was recommended to be paid by the finance committee. Responding to a request for information Chairman Latourette of the committee said he had examined with Mr. Green the first item in the bill pertaining to charges on Seventh street property but had no opportunity to investigate the other items in the bill. He presumed they were about right—at least fully as much as Mr. Green was entitled to. Then the recommendation of the committee was adopted.

The council went into committee of the whole with Randall in the chair to declare the election of John Trembath chief engineer and August Astmas assistant engineer of the fire department. Then a resolution by O'Connell was adopted appointing the following judges and clerks of election and polling places: First Ward—Judges, T. F. Ryan, M. E. Willoughby and John Green; clerks J. E. Rhoades and Wallace Cole; polling place Cataract engine house.

Second Ward—Judges, S. Walker, S. B. Califf and H. Straight; clerks, O. E. A. Freytag and H. L. Kelly; polling place at sash and door factory.

Five dollars paid by the Willamette Silver bank for theatre license was ordered refunded. The committee on streets and public property was instructed to confer with the city engineer relative to having surveyed with a view to establishing a grade thereon the streets not already surveyed between Third and Thirteenth and Center and Taylor streets. Latourette wanted the work to be open to bids but the others objected on the grounds that the city engineer could do it cheaper than any other and he would be present to give any information wanted at any time whereas if a transient surveyor should get the job his data would not be subject to the demand of the council.

The committee on streets and public property was instructed to have the cemetery put in presentable order for decoration day and to expend the cemetery funds on hand for such improvement. The chief of police was authorized to secure a poundmaster, to be paid from fees and the mayor was instructed to confer with the city attorney relative to the bearing of the Australian election law upon the coming city election and to call a special meeting of the council to arrange the matter if necessary.

The Rhode Island Election.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., April 7.—At 10 o'clock this morning the vote for governor stood: Brown, republican, 25,187. Wardwell, democrat, 22,972. Gilbert, prohibitionist, 1,411. Barton, peoples, 179. This makes a total of 48,849, the largest vote ever cast in Rhode Island.

Rev. H. A. Barden of Salem will occupy the pulpit of the Baptist church next Sunday morning and evening. Rev. Gilman Parker will preach in the First Baptist church of Portland Sunday.

MARCH WEATHER.

Eleven Storms on the Coast—Temperature Higher than Usual.

March, 1892, had eleven storms that affected Pacific slope weather. Precipitation fell in portions of Washington on twenty-three days during the month; in Oregon nineteen days; in northern California on fifteen days; in Nevada on ten days; in Utah on thirteen days; and in Arizona on six days.

Excepting at Walla Walla, Baker City, Winnemucca, Fresno, Los Angeles, Yuma and Salt Lake City, where the precipitation was slightly in excess, and at Tatoosh Island where it was in excess by 2.7 inches, the precipitation was generally slightly deficient, except at Olympia, Portland and Fort Canby where the deficiencies for the month ranged from 1.8 to 3.3 inches. In the district north of the 40th parallel of latitude the main temperature of the month averaged from one to four degrees higher than the normal; south of that parallel it ranged from normal to two degrees below, the latter in the western portion of southern California.
