WEATHER AND CROPS.

Report of the Condition in Western Oregon for the Week.

WEATHER. A higher temperature has prevailed during the past week but it is yet below the average, the deficiency ranging from two to five degrees a day. General and quite heavy showers prevailed the forepart of the week; the total precipitation for the week ranging from one and one-half to one inch. The sunshine was fifty per cent below the average for the week. Occasional light frosts were experienced, especially on the 8th and 9th. CROPS. There has been little growth to vegetation during the week. Warmth and sunshine are badly needed. Grass is luxuriant, and in the southern counties the first crop is being cut. Wheat on lowlands continues to have a yellow color. Early sown spring wheat on higher ground is doing fairly well; the growth is rank and injury may be done as there may be too much straw. Late spring seeding has been further delayed and there is much yet to be done. If favorable weather should now set in there would be a wonderfully rapid and healthy growth to vegetation. Hops are not coming up well, though the promise is good. It is daily more evident that the cold winds and rains have injured the berry and fruit crop, though it is expected that there will be an average yield, due to the large acreage of young trees coming into bearing. In Curry county peaches, prunes, pears and cherries will be a partial failures. In the other counties the damage was principally done to the fruit on the low lands.

Northwest News Notes. According to the latest accounts there will be a good many peaches this year in the Rogue river vicinity in spite of the frosts. Some orchards are not touched at all by the cool evenings.

Farmers near Colfax are complaining still of raids by cattle thieves. The Palouse Gazette reports that one farmer in that neighborhood lost twenty-three in one night last week, while seven were missing from the pasture of one of his neighbors. A warm reception awaits the thief should he be caught.

Times Mountaineer: We heard today of a man in this county, who stored his wool last fall, refusing to take fourteen cents a pound for the clip. In March last his wool was shipped to San Francisco, and yesterday he received returns from the California house, stating that the wool had been sold for twelve cents. Counting freight and warehouse charges he considers the product netted him about ten and one-half cents.

Coos Bay News: Carl LaDee showed up the biggest eastern clam on Monday that we have yet seen on Coos bay. It was dug on the clam flats below town, and measured eight inches in length and ten inches in circumference. We have other species of the clams on the bay, among which the cobog, which grows very large, but it is a rarity to find an eastern clam of the above size.

Fearful of a flood in the Powder river, the city council in Baker City ordered removal of the Kennedy dam, and it was blown up the other evening with giant powder. Other dams on the stream will probably also be removed.

Hon. S. W. Condon, of Eugene, reports having a rough trip going to Coos bay to attend court. On the way from Drain to Scottsburg the stage broke down five times and tipped over once. Better county roads are evidently greatly needed in Coos county.

A. E. Dart, of La Grande, wants a large number of Mongolian pheasants for breeding purposes. The pheasants imported into the Grande Ronde valley early this spring are reported as doing finely. A flock of half a dozen birds was seen near La Grande last Tuesday.
