### GENERAL ORDERS FOR DECORATION DAY, MAY 30th, 1892.

Headquarters of Decoration Day Committee, Grand Army Hall, May 29th, 1892.  
The undersigned having been appointed Grand Marshal upon the occasion of the observance of Decoration day hereby assumes command and promulgates the following orders.

First. Headquarters will be established on Main street in front of the post office.

Second. The following gentlemen have been appointed to act as aides to the Grand Marshal: C. T. Hickman, chief of staff, A. S. Lawton, Julius Logue, J. M. Lawrence, E. E. Williams, Chas. Babcock, and Clark Greenman.

Members of the staff will report mounted to C. T. Hickman at 8:30 o'clock a. m. to receive orders for the parade.

Third. Leaders of the several bands taking part will report their presence to the chief of staff who will assign them to their place in the parade.

The Clackamas band will report at headquarters promptly at 8:45 a. m. and in charge of an officer will march to the Union school building and escort the children, who will be assembled under the superintendency of Prof. Strange, to Pope's hall, halting at the Catholic school on Main street for the children of that school who, under Father Hillebrand, will form in rear of the column. On reaching hall the band will proceed to the firemen's headquarters and escort the several companies to their place in line.

The Oregon City cornet band in charge of an officer will escort the Oregon National Guard, G. A. R., Sons of Veterans and Knights of Pythias to their designated place in line.

Fourth. The column will form at 9:45 and move promptly at 10 o'clock. F. company G. N. G., will act as escort to the Grand Army and will form on Main, right resting on Sixth street.

The Grand Army will form on left of the National Guard followed by the Sons of Veterans. The Knights of Pythias will form on left of the Sons followed by the firemen.

The Ladies Relief corps in carriages will form on left of firemen, followed by mayor, city council and county court in carriages. Children in carriages will form in rear of county court.  
Fifth. The several organizations will form promptly in the order named, thereby enabling the column to move promptly in order to avoid the heat of the noon day sun.  
On arriving at Main and Seventh street, the column will halt, form a hollow square, where Meade post will present a beautiful banner to the Sons of Veterans. At the close of this ceremony the column will retrace the march going up Main to Tenth street, up incline to Seventh street, up this street to cemetery. At close of services at cemetery, the column will return by same line of march.
