THE OREGON CITY MINT:-No more appropriate design for the keystone of an Oregon bank could be conceived than the one which has been selected for the place of honor in the new stone front of the Capital National bank. The keystone carries the image of a ten-dollar piece of the days of '49, which bears the letters "K. M. T. R. C. S., O. T." Since its exhibition in the bank window it has caused no little comment and curiosity. Among the events of 1849 was the minting of \$50,000 at Oregon City under act of the provisional legislature and without license from the United States. WEATHER AND CROPS

Report of the Condition in Western Oregon for the Week. WEATHER.

Slightly warmer, though not quite normal, temperature has prevailed. There has been more than the usual the the 14th, 19th and 21st, but not BUY sufficient to be of appreciable benefit.

The cool, cloudy and occasional showery weather has been unfavorable to haymaking, which is now in full operation. Large crops are being secured. There has been some improvement in the wheat prospects, but yet it is below the condition that it was one year ago.

Through the Williamette valley the ereal crop is as usual, good, but not fully an average. In Douglas county the grain prospects are much better than common. In Josephine and Jackson counties the winds have been drying, and farmers are generally disap pointed in their grain crops. In the immediate coast countles complaint as yet relative to a probable shortage in anything except fruit and this in all of the counties of western Oregon is a poor crop; not over sixty per cent of the usual amount of fruit will be secured this year. Cherries, which are not ripe, and prunes, are especially a short crop. There has been a marked absence of insects so far, probably due to the fact that many of them were hatched in February and March, and then were killed by the cold rains of April. The hope have a better growth and are doing very well; spraying, to prevent the ravages of the hop louse. has begun.
