The Tariff and Wages.

The Portland Telegram thinks it proves the protection idea of the republicans to be hollow mockery when there are iron age troubles in some parts of the East and there has been a cut of wages in the Carnegie works during the operation of the Mc-Kinley law. If the Telegram will take the poins to investigate it will find that the Mc-Kinley law makes a radical reduction in the customs duties on manufactured profucts of iron and steel.
