Oregon City's Prospects.

The deal that is just consummated whereby the General Electric company, composed of the consolidated Thomsou-Houston and Edison Electric companies, obtain an interest in the Oregon City water power is fraught with great possibilities for this town. The expenditure of \$2,500,000 in improvements here will in itself be important, but from the nature of the case that will be but a beginning of a new era of prosperity, for it is merely by way of preparation for extensive manufacturing industries.

Every one of good judgment who has seen the falls of the Willamette were impressed with the capabilities of the situation. The early days in the West were not favorable to the development of manufacturing and for Cleveland. so for many years nothing was done to utilize the marvelous power running to waste here. Since the advent of adequate means of transportation more attention has been directed to this water power. A number of of him. important factories are already in operation here but there has been nothing like the full and systematic development that the situa-

The new concern will be instrumental in releasing money now tied up by the comparatively sluggish movement of property. It can scarcely be denominated a boom in the ordinary acceptation of the term. The Cour d' Alene Mining Trouble

About 3000 miners in the Courd' Alene country of northern Idaho were in insurrec tion last week, and the state militia and about 1000 regular troops were put in the field to quell the disturbance. Shoshone county, in which that mining district is sitnated, was proclaimed under martial law and for about ten days its affairs have been administered by the military.

The old disagreement about wages is at the bottom of this difficulty. It began last April when the mine owners refused to grant an advance in wages and shut down their mines because the men would not work for the pay the owners were willing to give. The mine owners association has been trying since to start and work the mines met the opposition of the union miners who July 22, 1802; demanded the advanced scale. There was more or less violence on various occasions but not till July 11 did the difficulty assume the phase of an insurrection.

The union miners are determined that the mine owners shall pay the prices they demand or cease work in their mines. They have driven 400 or 500 non-union men "scabs," out of the country. Several nonunion men were killed and the others were giad to escape with their lives when the rioting began. But matters have quieted down since martial law was declared and some 500 of the rioters are now under ar-

The President's Proclamation Withdrawine Public Lands for It.

WHEREAS, it is provided by section 24, of the act of congress, approved March 3d, 1891, entitled, "An Act to repeal timber culture laws, and for other purposes," "That the president of the United States may from time to time, set apart and reserve, in any state or territory having public land bearing forests, in any part of the public lands wholly or in part covered with timber or undergrowth, whether of commercial value or not, as public reservations, and the president shall, by public proclamation, deciare the establishment of such reservations

And Whereas, the public lands in the state of Oregon within the limits hereinafter described, are in part covered with timber, and it appears that the public good would be promoted by setting apart and reserving

said lands as a public reservation. Now, Therefore, I, Benjamin Harrison, president of the United States, by virtue of the power in me vested by section 24 of the aforesaid act of congress, do hereby make known and proclaim that there is berely reserved from entry or settlement and set apart as a public reservation, all those certain tracts, pieces or parcels of land lying and being situate in the state of Oregon, and
