CLACKAMAS COUNTY PLAT.—When one considers the carelessness with which deeds are many times made out it is no wonder that land titles are frequently sadly mixed.

Clackamas county has its due amount of confusion in this respect.

There are plats of Park Place and of Park

addition to Oregon City; of Pleasant

Place, Pleasant Little Homes, Irvin's

Little Homes, Pleasant Hill Park,

Pleasant Hill addition to Oregon City

and Mount Pleasant addition to Oregon

City; of Darnell's addition to Oregon

City. There is no town of Edgewood in the county though deeds describing

property in such a town are frequently

filed. There is an Edgewood addition to

Oregon City. Marshfield is a part of

Clackamas. The plat of the Clackamas

county addition to Oregon City was filed

Aug. 10, 1850, while the Oregon City

plat was not filed till Jan. 7, 1851.

The plat of St. Johns, the town on the Willamette below Portland, was filed Oct.

7, 1852 and it was then in this county.

The Milwaukee plat was filed June 21,

1865, and the plat of "Cannemah, Oregon

Territory," Sept. 16, 1865, Hedges and

Barlow being the proprietors. J. C.

Truettler filed the plat of Oswego Jan.

10, 1867. The plat of the Bull Run

water pipe line was filed by A. G.

Cunningham and A. B. Talbert Jan. 29,

1883 and was designed to control the

scheme for getting Bull Run water to

Portland. It was not entirely successful,

however. The present project bears no

relation to it. Among the odd things in

deeds was one recently seen in front

New Era precinct in which the tract con-

veyed was described by metes and

bounds. But the justice who made the

instrument neglected to place the decimal

points in the numbers of chains

mentioned and the lines according to the

deed go rambling off many miles over

the country instead of a few rods. For

instance 6.30 chains was made to read

read 6.300, chains etc.

small raft which serves as a landing for

small boats and a resting place for weary

fisherman at the foot of Eighth street.

### IN THE MATTER OF SEWERS.

Self Cleansing Channels must be of Small Sectional Area.

An artificial existence must, to a certain extent, arise wherever masses of human beings congregate. Each individual is influenced by the habits and practices of those around him, and the preservation of the health of every class is equally important to all. Sanitary laws and regulations are intended to give power to communities, which single individuals can not possess. The extent to which good sanitary measures are carried indicates, in a degree, the state of civilization and refinement. The modern works of sewerage have been experiments made for improving the health and comfort of communities; and it is evident from public records that they have largely accomplished the end for which they were designed.

Of many of the important improvements for the welfare of a city none present themselves of greater value than the proper carrying off of all sewage matter. To obtain this result perfectly, the sewers should be of such a size, form and inclination as will convey refuse without deposit or stoppage, to the main outlet, by means of the ordinary quantity of water used for domestic and other purposes.

The practice of appositing the size of sewers to the work they have to do seems as a rule to be comparatively recent. The only idea apparent has been to make a difference between the sizes of the mains and those of the laterals and to get them all large enough.

In order to be self-cleansing, sewers must be adapted, in their size and grade, to the amount of sewage they have to carry. If the ordinary run of water is spread thin over a broad surface the scouring effect is lost and deposits will occur, but with the same amount of water gathered in a narrow channel and running deep the scouring effect is greatly increased and the sewers are likely to keep themselves clean. An experiment in London was made in the main line sewer, which is 5½ feet high by 3½ feet wide, by laying a 12 inch pipe on the invert, and building a head wall at the end of it, so that the whole sewage discharged by the collateral sewers was forced to pass through this pipe. The velocity of the stream in the pipe was found to be 4½ times greater than the velocity of the same amount of water on the bed of the old sewer. The recognition of this principle of the increase of velocity by the flow was largely influential in causing many engineers to abandon the idea of cleansing sewers by sending men into them to do it by hand.

Geo. E. Waring was appointed in 1879 by the United States national board of health to make actual gaugings of the dry weather flow of public sewers in different parts of the country and he arrived at the following results: A sewer in Milwaukee draining an area of 70 acres with a population of 3035 persons at its greatest flow filled a six-inch pipe 5½ inches deep. In the city of St. Louis a sewer draining an area containing 1370 houses occupied by a population of 8200 had its greatest flow carried through a 12-inch pipe which was filled to a depth of less than seven inches. A sewer in Burlington, Vermont, 2790 feet long draining fifty-four houses showed at its greatest flow a depth of 1½ inches in a 6-inch pipe.

The system being completed in Oregon City will be sufficient in capacity for all time to come because the area is so limited that it cannot be thickly enough populated to overtax sewers eight or ten inches in diameter. If the whole city were to be drained in the sub-town system there might be danger of having to put in larger pipes some day.
