THE COUNTY COURT.

BUSINESS TRANSACTED AT THE REGULAR OCTOBER TERM.

Road Matters Attended to, Saloon Licenses Granted—Bills Allowed.

At the regular term of commissioners' county court for October held the last four days of last week the following proceedings were had:

In the Muecke road matter the report of the viewers and remonstrance was filed and excoise bill of \$42.30 audited. Testimony of William Barlow and G. Muecke was taken and a review and re-survey was ordered.

The reports of the surveyor and viewers of the S. D. Coalman road was ordered opened and the expense bill of \$75.10 was ordered paid.

The reports of the surveyor and viewers on the T. L. Charman change in the J. T. Apperson road were filed and the desired change was ordered to be made. The expense of \$13 was paid.

The Milwaukee and Foster road was ordered opened upon the report of the surveyor and viewers, and the expense of \$19.70 was paid.

Supervisor F. Weise of road district No. 5 was authorized to procure lumber and spikes with which to re-deck the bridge in his district.

Supervisor A. S. Lawton of road district No. 22 reported that the Rock Island bridge was dangerous. The matter was referred to the householders in the vicinity of the road who have power, by petition, to have the location of the road changed so as to avoid passing the dangerous place.

The sheriff was ordered to pay over to the clerks of school districts No. 67, 69 and 74 the amounts of the delinquent taxes collected by him, less the cost of collection.

In the matter of the improvement of the Harmony road the people having subscribed and paid the sum of \$477.50, \$367.50 of which had been paid into the county treasury, \$412.50 was appropriated from the county funds and the county judge was authorized to let the contract to W. H. Counsel and to employ Alfred Clark to superintend the work.

The clerk was directed to issue a warrant for \$12 a month from Nov. 1 for the support of Robert Foster, a pauper.

Supervisor Magone of road district No. 27 was instructed to demand \$12.50 of the owners of the steam engine that damaged the Springbrook bridge and \$25 of the owners of the engine that damaged the bridge near Mrs. Libberg's house, and in case of their refusal to pay to begin suit against them for the amounts.

A warrant of \$4.40 was ordered, issued for the keeping of Fred Karsprig from Sept. 10 to 21 at which latter date he ceased to be a county charge.

The monthly allowance for the keeping of Fred Rieckel was increased to \$15 from October 1.

John Lewis was appointed constable for district No. 11.

Henry Kobler was granted a license to sell liquor at Barlow.

The bill of \$54.48 for repairs on the Scott's mills bridge was ordered paid and Marion county requested to stand half the expense as it is on the county line.

The contract for constructing a bridge across Rock creek on the Byland road was awarded to I. S. Scott for \$397. C. F. Royal bid so much per foot and W. H. Yoiler bid \$325 for cheaper material.

Lester M. Leland received a nomination to the state agricultural college at Corvallis.

A warrant was directed issued to Superintendent Gibson for \$70, being fees due for the districts reporting to him.

It was ordered that the clerk notify the East Side Railway company to grade Main street, Milwaukie, in the manner specified in the order granting the right of way.

The assessment roll was examined, corrected and approved and it was ordered that the clerk make two extra copies of the roll, one to be transmitted to the secretary of state and one to go to the sheriff of Clackamas county.

Lewis Hohenlinter of Oswego was granted a saloon license.

In the matter of the Oregon City and Cutting's Mill road it was ordered that upon the payment of the sum of \$40 into the county treasury, the people along the route having performed extra labor to the value of \$110, the county appropriate \$160 to be used in extending the improvement from the end of the Parker job recently completed to the northwest end of a hill made by him on a contract previously completed. W. H. Smith was appointed to superintend the job and C. D. Latourette to collect unpaid subscriptions and gravel instead of crushed rock was authorized to be used.

The petition of George Moore, et al for viewers to locate a county road was granted and County Surveyor Smyth was ordered to survey and A. S. Lawton, W. B. Partlow and C. C. Williams to view the route, to meet at the place of beginning Thursday Oct. 20.

An appropriation of \$107.50 for the improvement of the road from the foot of Oakley hill to Barlow station, to become available when the citizens of that locality shall have paid a like amount for the same purpose to the county treasurer was made.

Thomas Armstrong was authorized to purchase 2000 feet of lumber and powder use and caps to the value of \$50 for use on the roads in his district.

W. T. Whitlock's proposition to sell his safe to the county for \$130 was accepted and warrant ordered drawn for the amount.

The boundaries of Needy precinct were established as follows: beginning at sec or 12, t 5 s, r 1 e, thence north 3 1/2 miles, thence west 5 e, thence south to Bear creek, thence down Bear creek to Pudding river, thence up Pudding river to Butte creek, thence up Butte creek to the south boundary of s 11, t 5 s, r 1 e, thence east to the place of beginning; polling place at Needy.

The boundaries of Lower Molalla precinct were established as follows: beginning at south bank of the Molalla river on line to the 1/4 s corner between s 28 and 29, thence east 4 miles, thence south one mile, thence 1 1/2 miles thence north to the Molalla river, thence down

stream to the place of beginning; polling place as usual.
