THE MARQUAM FAIR.

List of Premiums Awarded to Exhibitors this year.

The Butte Creek fair held at Marquam this year was one of the best ever held by the association. Compared with last year's fair the improvement is not marked because last year was an unusually good season for farm crops and it was not difficult to get a magnificent display of products of the soil.

The live stock exhibit this year was probably the best ever made there, and this is saying a good deal for it. In the department of domestic arts the usual high degree of excellence was manifested. The managers of the Butte Creek fair were compelled to deal heroically with a class of fakirs and gamblers who made their appearance on the fair grounds, but they got rid of the parasites. The accommodations had been increased by building of an addition to the pavilion.
