THE COUNTY COURT.

NUMEROUS ROADS ACCEPTED AND ORDERED OPENED.

The Tualatin Bridge Completed—Canada Thistle in District No. 54—Bills Allowed.

1. In the matter of the Muenke road, report of viewers and remonstrance filed J. S. Risley, Frank Jaggard and C. C. Babcock appointed appraisers of damages, to meet at Aurora on Wednesday, Nov. 30 at 10 o'clock a. m. Expense incurred \$23.10

2. Report of viewers of the Oregon City and Apperson road filed, approved and road ordered opened. Expense incurred \$13.40.

3. Report of Sidney Smyth, superintendent of the Tualatin bridge, recommending acceptance approved, and warrant ordered drawn in favor of the Pacific Bridge company for \$4350, the cost of bridge and approaches

4. Proposition of the Portland Water committee to pay 40 per cent of the cost of a bridge across the Sandy providing said bridge does not cost to exceed \$6000 was accepted there being a strong petition from resident householders for such action and the clerk was authorized to advertise for bids to be opened Dec. 8, 1892.

5. J. W. Dorra supervisor of road district No. 54 reported the presence of Canada thistle in that district and A. B. Marquam was appointed commissioner to extirpate the thistle in accordance with an act of the legislature.

6. Report of county judge on the improvement of the Boon's Ferry road approved and \$55 appropriated to continue said work which shall be done under the supervision of the road supervisor.

7. Application of Co F for aid to maintain company and help defray expenses of the same granted, and clerk ordered to draw a warrant for \$25 the first of each month beginning with November.

8. The allowance for the maintenance of Robert Foster was increased to \$20 per month to date from Nov. 1.

9. Clerk ordered to notify M. J. Snyder, supervisor of the road district at the Upper Clackamas bridge of threatened danger to said bridge from overhanging trees and their removal required.

10. Allowance for care of Margaret King increased to \$8 per month to date from November 1.

11. Report of Judge Meldrum upon expenditures for stationery approved, and the sum of \$50 appropriated to be expended in like manner as required by future needs of the county.

12. Pacific Bridge company ordered to remove the old structure at the Upper Clackamas bridge and cover with galvanized iron the chords of the new bridge. The sum of \$50 allowed for removing old bridge and 90 cents per foot for iron covering.

13. Warrant for \$488.99 ordered issued to Judge Meldrum to pay city sewer assessment.

14. H. H. Johnson and D. W. Kinnard appointed to examine the property map of Clackamas county and report on the same at the December term.

15. C. W. Bentley appointed to care for Calvin Harrington and the sum of \$10 per month appropriated to pay for the same.

16. A petition being presented for an appropriation for the Gribble Prairie and Molalla road in the Klinger lane, and it appearing from the certificate of J. W. Smith supervisor that the sum of \$150 had been contributed by private subscription and expended in improving the road, it was ordered that \$100 be appropriated to be expended under the direction of J. W. Smith.

17. C. S. Chase appointed constable for magisterial district No. 13.

18. Report of W. H. Smith on the improvement of the Highland road approved and a warrant for \$200.23, the

amount of expense incurred ordered drawn.

19. Warrant for \$80 ordered drawn in favor of Wm. Jones for clearing and grubbing the Harmony road. Petition of R. L. McLaughlin et al for the improvement of the road in district No. 1 considered. It appearing that the sum of \$252 had been paid into the county treasury by the petitioners to aid in proposed improvement and the further sum of \$75 in labor having been contributed, it was ordered that there be appropriated the further sum of \$358 to be expended under the direction of R. S. McLaughlin, the total expense not to exceed \$716.

20. Ordered relative to the Rock Creek bridge, that upon the filing of the favorable report of the superintendent of construction, Commissioner Bair, the clerk shall draw a warrant for \$397 in favor of I. S. Scott, the contractor.

21. It appearing from the report of J. W. Roots supervisor of road district No. 3 that there had been expended under his direction the sum of \$448.50 in excess of the road tax and to prosecute the work being presented there was appropriated the sum of \$100 to be expended under the direction of J. W. Roots.

22. Report of W. W. Irwin on improvement of Oakley Hill road approved and expense warrant for \$192.72 ordered drawn.

23. In the matter of submitting to the circuit court without controversy the claim of W. T. Whitlock it was ordered that the clerk in behalf of the county certify to the court a statement of facts relative to the claim.

24. Sheriff authorized to accept from J. S. Holm \$11 in full payment of taxes on lots in Sellwood, it appearing that said Holm did not own the property assessed for the balance of the tax at the time of the assessment.

25. Millage and per diem allowed as follows: C. Bair four days and twenty-eight miles \$14.80; B. Scott four days and eighteen miles \$13.80.

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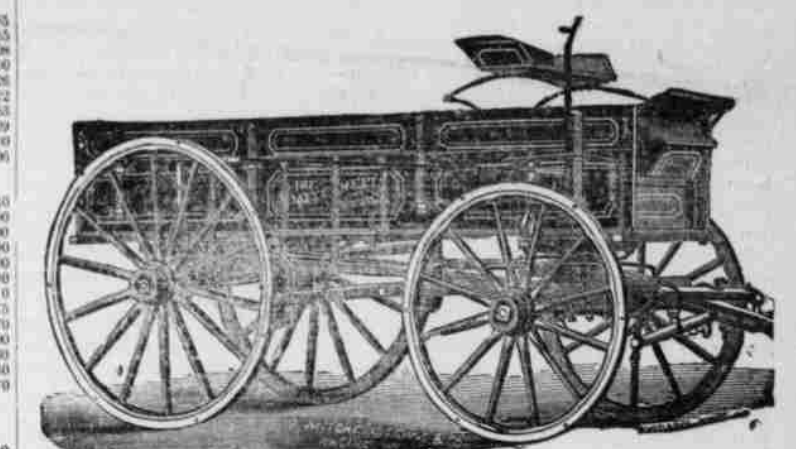
