THE FREE READING ROOM.

Its Officers and Standing—Various Donations—When Open.

Through the earnest efforts of several of our leading citizens the free reading room has been established upon a firm basis, and is now in a fair way to so improve as to result in much good to the young men and boys of this community. It is now liberally patronized from the hours of 9 a. m. to 9:30 p. m. and with the addition of more papers and books made possible by increased subscriptions the room will doubtless prove more popular than ever. The following named officers and committees will keep the affairs of the association in good working shape during the year: E. G. Caulfield, president; James Shaw, vice president; W. A. Huntley, Secretary; Jas. P. Shaw, treasurer; board of trustees, T. W. Sullivan, Rev. G. Wm. Giboney and C. G. Huntley; finance committee, Rev. A. Hillebrand, C. H. Eye and F. S. Kelly; entertainment committee, Rev. G. Sykes, Charles Moserve and H. Hargraves.

The treasurer's report showed a balance of \$5.70 on hand. The finance committee purpose to continue the solicitation for monthly contributions till they have an income sufficiently large to run the room with a full line of newspapers and periodicals, including the best published. Publishers will be asked to contribute their publications either in whole or part of the subscription price.

The society is indebted to many public spirited citizens for contributions in the shape of fixtures, etc., for the room, which have helped largely to make it convenient and pleasant.

Among these are the following: Burmeister & Andresen, a fine eight day clock; Bellomy & Busch, pictures and frames; Holman & Warner, frames for placards to be placed in hotels and public places; Charman & Co. glass for frames; the ENTERPRISE, stationery, placards and exchanges; W. The association was called to order in the public school building at 10:30 a. m. by the president, H. S. Gibson.

Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

The following persons were elected as members of the association: Helen McCown, L. A. Read, H. Hammond and L. T. Brooks.

How to teach measurements was taken up and nicely illustrated by Prof. Pringle. The speaker believes denominations should follow simple numbers. Here we should proceed slowly and try to make the work practical. Drill until pupils can make practical measurements readily.

A pleasing recitation was rendered by Miss Thomas.

The subject of Geography was introduced by Fannie G. Porter. The following persons took part in the discussion that followed, L. A. Read, Prof. Pringle, Chas. E. Pease and Helena McCown.

Spelling was presented by Chas. E. Pease.

Rendering of the popular recitation "Shamus O'Brien" by Prof. Thomas of Clackamas was loudly applauded.

The following resolution was passed unanimously:

Resolved that the thanks of this association are hereby tendered the people of Clackamas and especially Prof. Thomson for the entertainment of the teachers.
