CHRISTMAS NOTICES.

Christmas Services and Entertainment at the Catholic Church.

Father Hillerbrand of St. John's church states that they have in preparation for the Christmas season several choice services and entertainments which will be very interesting and attractive.

The first of these services will be on Christmas eve when the children of the church will give an entertainment to the Catholic Knights of Oregon City who in return for the compliment of the children will retaliate by dispensing presents to the children. Hour of exercises 8 p. m. All are welcome.

Christmas day will be observed as follows: Mass at 8 o'clock a. m. with an English sermon followed by mass at 9 o'clock with sermon in German. At 10:30 solemn high mass will be observed with English sermon. The music at these services will be rendered by the choir and orchestra who will render Spites grand mass which will be much finer than anything heretofore heard in Oregon City. At 7:30 solemn vespers to be followed by the blessing of two beautiful memorial statues which cost \$150 presented by Mrs. Emma McDonald upon behalf of herself and deceased husband.

At 9 a. m. on Tuesday mass will be celebrated in honor of the feast of St. John the Apostle, patron saint of the church here. In the evening the altar society will give a "penny a pound" sociable, at which much fun and frolic is expected. This is free to all and ladies are expected to be in demand.

On Monday there appeared in town two men and a young woman who before night became noticeable by her drunken and fearful appearance. They had stopped at L. A. Noble's where the men gave their names as L. Adkins and Ambrose Christie and the girl as Jones, Christie claiming her as his wife.

Between five and six in the evening Christie took her off towards Canemah, but parties had become suspicious and they were followed, an officer called and John Kelly arrested Christie and subsequently Adkins. The men were placed in jail and on Wednesday were tried, when it was developed that the girl's name is Kate Ronco of Salem where Christie had got her in his power and for threatening to kill her had lain in jail. Shortly after his release he took her against her will to Dayton in a buggy and subsequently to Portland and Vancouver where he forced her to become a prostitute.

The evidence did not implicate Adkins in this foul treatment and Judge Fouts find him \$40 for simple assault which he paid. Christie was held, charged with lewd cohabitation and his bonds fixed at \$1000, which falling to get he will have five months to lie in jail before the grand jury meets. An attempt is being made to get the girl in the Refuge home.

ARRESTED FOR TRESPASS.—FOR SOME time past John Batdorf and Henry Gilbert have been hauling poles for the east side electric road. Last Saturday while engaged in placing these poles their work required them to cross a part of the Lovejoy place below town, which G. H. Oldenberg has leased and upon which he has posted trespass notices. Complaint was made by Oldenberg before Judge Fouts, and Batdorf and Gilbert were arrested for trespass. The Judge released them on their own recognizance to appear Tuesday, which they did when the trial was postponed for one week.

Board of Trade.

The board held its regular monthly meeting on Monday evening.

C. O. T. Williams reported from the special committee adverse to county division that the remonstrances had been printed and would be sent out soon.

Letters from Mrs. Cook offering to show stereopticon views of Oregon City in connection with her lecture tour throughout the east referred to advertising committee.

The Eagle Creek road matter was discussed and it was decided to renew the offer made three years ago which was for Eagle Creek to raise \$1000 and the board to raise enough to make it \$2500. Judge Meltrum spoke of the entire feasibility of the Baker Ferry and Deep Creek river road.

Lionel Stagg representing the Oregonian presented its advantages as an advertising medium, offering the board a page for \$175. A committee to raise \$100 or more of this was appointed, consisting of C. O. T. Williams, T. F. Ryan and T. L. Charman, with authority to bind the board for such a sum as they should see fit.

The president was authorized to draw a resolution favorable to daily mail service from Oswego to Wilsonville and return via Oregon City, and the president and secretary were instructed to sign a petition for the same.

The City Council.

On Tuesday evening there was an adjourned meeting of the city council at which an ordinance was introduced to refund 30.23 per cent of the Main street sewer assessment which was ordered published.

An ordinance establishing the grade of certain streets on the hill was also introduced and was ordered published.

A notice of proposal to change grade of Main street from Moss to Fourteenth was ordered published.

The committee reported that Hargrave & Bortwick had refused to contract to build a jail, owing to a misunderstanding about other than Oregon City sand and gravel being required in building, and the contract was let to Kinney and Tower for \$2296.42 with J. D. Renner, W. W. Marrs, Geo. Broughton and Jas. Roake as bondsmen.

A special committee consisting of councilmen Porter, White and Cooke was appointed to consider the advisability of building the bridge at Fourteenth and Madison streets.
