These gentlemen are members of the recently organized Oregon City Land company and they have the experience and means to do good work as they were in Minneapolis during the rapid growth of that city, and having carefully looked over the field they are convinced of the great advantage possessed by our city and have organized this company with an office on First street Portland. They are preparing to make such a showing of the advantages of our water power as will attract everybody's attention to Oregon City. Tuesday's Oregonian among other things says, "that Oregon City is the coming great manufacturing center of the Pacific Northwest can no longer be disputed, and it is fortunate that science has made such rapid strides within the past few years, so as to enable her to utilize to the best advantage her wonderful water power.

Oregon City will surpass Minneapolis in her growth. With an electric line of cars running on both the east and west sides of the Willamette from Portland to Oregon City, thus affording constant and cheap transportation, and the inducements now held out to manufacturers, we can assure Oregon City of a population of 25,000 in the next two years. A company has just been formed for the purpose of keeping before the public the merits of this great manufacturing center.
