WILL REBUILD.

New Building for the Oregon City Sash and Door Company.

The Oregon City Sash and Door company have completed their plans for a new building which they will erect immediately near the site of the present mill.

The company would like to have remained where they are but were forced to move by the building of the motor line in front of their property and the manner in which the temporary improvement of the road was laid. The trouble in front of their factory will be about eleven feet above the present road bed and the company was anxious to have the property owners improve that block at this time so that they could make necessary changes about their mill to remain where they are and still have convenient access to the road to enable them to get material in and out with the greatest ease. But the property holders would not improve and the temporary road is placed too high to permit them to pass under the motor line with their wagons and they would be obliged to carry all material and manufactured goods across the road. For these reasons they say they are obliged to move.

THE NEW BUILDING.

Will stand on the lots just north of their present mill and will be a substantial structure standing lengthwise to the road, the dimensions being 56x84 feet with 24-foot posts. There will also be an addition 24x60 on the north end to be used for an engine and boiler room, shaving pit and drying room. The main room on the ground floor will be clear except a row of posts through the center which support the second floor and to which will be attached the main shaft. This room will be used exclusively for the planing mill except a corner in the north west 22x24 which will be fitted up for an office. The upper floor will be the sash and door department and the space will be clear, the roof requiring no support as it is trussed.

A new engine is on its way which will give 60 horse power and other new and improved machinery will be put in to replace some that is now in use. Work will be begun at once and the mill pushed to speedy completion.
