COUNCIL MEETING.

Short But Animated Session—Building Permits Issued—Telephone Franchise

The meeting of the council on Friday evening was marked by the absence of several members. The particular business for the evening was the passage of the ordinance allowing a rebate of the assessment paid to build a sewer along Main street, which was duly passed.

An error having occurred in the original copy of the ordinance establishing sewer districts in the omission of the enacting clause, that ordinance was ordered republished with the missing clause supplied.

The application of N. O. Walden, G. A. Harding and Mrs. P. F. Morey for permission to repair the building next south of the Odd Fellow's brick elicited a lively debate, but was finally granted.

An ordinance granting to C. G. Miller and E. M. Rands permission to erect and maintain a telephone and district telegraph line in the city was introduced by Councilman O'Connell and ordered printed.

The application of Hamilton & Allen for permission to erect a two-story frame building on the southwest corner of Main and Ninth streets to be used as a store was granted.

The following petition was read and on motion referred back to the source from which it emanated, two members of the council voting in the negative.

The Way It Works.

The Oswego Iron Worker of last week contains the following items relative to the narrow gauge.

The completion of the eastside motor line will doubtless create one of those temporary furors that the end of a rail and a golden spike bring forth; but when it becomes emphatically known that the P. & W. V. or Southern Pacific Railroad company will run a branch to Oregon City from Oswego, the general rejoicing, especially on the east side, will suddenly subside. The eastside motor promises a magnificent trip of one and a half hours' duration. The P. & W. V. will transport passengers from Oregon City to Portland in just a half hour at a very accommodating rate. It will be speed versus a modern but played out boomer. This was on its editorial page. In the local column it says:

"The Sheridan train got through as far as Oswego Thursday evening and returned to Portland the same night. As this paper goes to press the local Airline and Sheridan trains were all off the track and stuck along the road. The mail train that went south Thursday morning is off at White's, another is off at Newberg, and the yesterday morning's local broke down at Riverview and did not arrive here from Portland until 12:45 p. m." It seems then that the narrow gauge with all its "speed" is not as sure as the old reliable Oregon City Transportation Co.'s boats, Altona and Ramona which never miss a trip and upon which the people of Oswego had to depend for transportation to Portland on Friday.

Obituary.

DIED—At Eagle Creek, Clackamas county, December 18, 1892, after a protracted illness, Lillie, daughter of Henry Wilhern and wife of Hugh Currin aged 27 years and 9 months.

Lillie Wilhern-Currin was a bright and lovable young woman and was held in universal esteem wherever known. In Eagle Creek where she spent the years of her childhood and youth and in Currinsville where she spent the few years of her married life she was esteemed and beloved by all. Her untimely death is a great loss to the community in which she lived and a sad affliction to her husband and the two bright children who are thus early deprived of a mother's love and care. It had been evident for some time that consumption had marked her as a victim, yet her friends hoped against hope till almost the last day and in spite of her protracted illness her quiet and peaceful death on the Sunday before Christmas at the home of her parents was a severe and seemingly sudden affliction.

McDERMOTT.—On Sunday, December 25th, 1892, at 10 a. m., Mrs. Elizabeth, wife of Henry McDermott, aged 60 years.

Mrs. McDermott was born in Finnon, county of Dunagall, Ireland, and was raised in Boston, Mass. She has been sick a long time with consumption, and death came to her relief on the Christmas day. Besides her husband she leaves two sons, Joseph and Hugh. The funeral service was conducted on Tuesday by Father Hillebrand of St. John's church.—Catholic Sentinel please copy.
