MOUNTAIN VIEW IMPROVEMENTS.—The citizens of the suburban territory on the hill south of Oregon City are becoming very much interested in the improvement of that locality and have for some time been discussing the wisdom of meeting and organizing for concerted action which will result in building up their section.

UPPER RIVER LINES.—That there is a growing demand for good boat service on the upper river connecting with Oregon City is becoming more evident.

WANT A MAIL ROUTE.—Joshua Gorbett of Colton was in town on Saturday. He has a plan for giving to Colton, Elwood and Lacey a semi-weekly mail, route to be from Lacey to Clarksville via Springwater to leave on Tuesday and Friday mornings and return to Lacey on Wednesday and Saturday.

BOARD OF TRADE.

Annual Meeting—Election and Reports of Officers.

The following named persons were unanimously elected members of the board: S. M. Ramsay, Geo. F. Horton, V. R. Hyde, E. C. Hamilton, H. L. Schiller, A. W. Schwan, Geo. Walling, Marr & Robertson by Geo. Marr, J. H. Black, H. Boyer, Bellomy & Busch by Frank Busch.

The following named members tendered their resignation to take effect immediately: I. Ackerman, H. L. Kelly and O. E. A. Freytag which resignations were accepted.

The advertising committee reported the relative to a pamphlet that the manuscript was prepared, but that the committee had conferred with the Portland General Electric company, which evinced a disposition to co-operate with the board in getting out a better pamphlet than the one contemplated, and the board authorized the committee to join with the electric company if possible.

The special committee on advertising the Oregonian reported that they had advertised as directed and that to meet the expense they had solicited subscription to the amount of \$185.25, including \$107.25 from the Portland General Electric Company, leaving \$78 to be paid by the board.

The special committee co-operating with a like committee from the council, reported that the charter as revised would probably be submitted to the council in a week or ten days, and that no innovation was contemplated by the committee except in permitting no deduction for indebtedness except the \$500 limit allowed by law.

The question of street improvement was called up and Sidney Smyth, city engineer, stated that during his trip east he investigated the question in several cities and found brick pavement, the best and cheapest, the expense being only about one-third that of asphaltum while with well burned brick it lasts for years.

The question of appropriately celebrating the completion of the electric line into the city, elicited a lively discussion and resulted in the appointment of E. E. Charman, E. M. Rands and T. F. Ryan as a committee to arrange matters.

The election of officers being next in order H. E. Cross, H. E. Cross and C. H. Canfield were placed in nomination. The ballot resulted in the election of C. H. Canfield.

C. O. T. Williams was chosen first vice president and T. F. Ryan second vice president. F. E. Donaldson was elected secretary. T. L. Charman was chosen treasurer.

The report of T. L. Charman, treasurer, was read and referred to the finance committee. The report made the following showing:

AMMONIA OR ALUM.

How to Detect Them.

Ammonia and alum are the most common adulterants used in the manufacture of baking powders. The government report shows that a large percentage of the baking powders on the market contain either one or the other, or both these pernicious drugs.

This wholesale use in an article of daily food, of one of the most injurious poisons is simply criminal. Slow ammonia poisoning produces disease of the stomach and is particularly injurious to the complexion. The presence of ammonia or alum in a baking powder, however, can easily be detected.

To Detect Ammonia. Mix one heaping teaspoonful of baking powder with one teaspoonful of water in a tin cup; boil thoroughly for a few moments, stir to prevent burning and if ammonia is present you can smell it in the rising steam.

To Detect Alum. Alum powder can be tested by putting a couple of teaspoonfuls of the powder in a glass of cold water. If no effervescence (that is, bubbling or summing) takes place, condemn the powder and return it at once.

Take one-half teaspoonful of baking powder in lid of say half pound can; char thoroughly over a strong alcohol flame, a good gas jet, or red hot coals. After charring (that is, burning until the whole mass is black) pour a little vinegar into the lid and smell the fumes. Alum powders give off sulphuretted hydrogen, which may be detected by its foul odor.
