COUNTY COURT.

Jury List Drawn—Usual Road Reports—New Justice of Peace.

Report of viewers on Leabo road with field notes and bill of expense amounting to \$82.60, filed and approved and the road ordered opened. Expense account allowed, except the claim of I. D. Hoffman which was laid over, leaving \$44.10 to be paid.

Petition of R. D. Stone et al for a county road laid over till the February term.

Herman Bruns, supervisor of road district No. 9 applied for bridge material and was authorized to procure 3000 feet to repair a defective bridge.

Petition of J. C. McMurray et al for the appointment of W. W. Gardner as justice of the peace for magisterial district No. 12 granted.

The clerk was authorized to draw a warrant for \$70 in favor of H. S. Gibson, school superintendent, the amount of his bill for school district reports.

The sum of \$8 per month from the first day of February will be allowed Mrs. Gash, a widow, the warrant to be drawn in favor of R. Scott who will report quarterly to the court.

Tender of \$28.72 by J. A. Strowbridge in payment of taxes accepted.

The court authorized the county judge to offer a reward of \$20 for the arrest and conviction of any one defacing or mutilating the suspension bridge.

Report of W. H. Smith, superintendent of work on repairing the bridge on the Forsyth road approved, and clerk authorized to draw warrants to pay bills to the amount of \$87.23, which includes the amount for lumber in repairing at the railroad crossing, which should be paid by the company.

Report of J. W. Roots, supervisor of road district No. 3, approved, and clerk authorized to issue warrants for the several amounts due to offset an equal sum subscribed by the district amounting to \$153.55.

Resignation of A. S. Lawton as supervisor of road district No. 22, accepted. No one was appointed to fill the vacancy.

The report of Marion county upon the construction of the Butte Creek bridge on the county line, filed and the clerk authorized to draw a warrant in favor of Marion county for \$110.91 and the clerk was ordered to return to Marion county a warrant for \$27.24 in favor of this county both to complete payment due from this county to Marion.

Jury list drawn and clerk ordered to place names in jury box.

Report of C. Rinearson supervisor of road district No. 2 approved. Expense of \$241.20 incurred for which the clerk was ordered to issue warrants to pay the several claims.

Court voted to hold an adjourned session on the 16th of January at 9 o'clock a. m.

Ordered that the clerk notify all persons in whose favor warrants are drawn for the care and keeping of paupers to report at the February term showing manner of expenditures, and ordered that hereafter all persons drawing warrants for paupers report quarterly.

The commissioners were allowed mileage and per diem as follows: C. Bair three days and 28 miles, \$11.80; R. Scott three days and 18 miles 10.80.

SUCCESSFUL POPULAR MOVEMENT.—The singing class recently organized on the bill has proven to be a most gratifying success in many ways. From the beginning it has been the aim of the promoters of this effort that the work of this class should be both thorough and effective. To this end they secured at considerable expense the services of Prof. Weischkul of Portland who as an instructor has no equal on the Pacific coast. There is a generally expressed desire for a continuance of these lessons and arrangements will in all probability be made for another term of ten weeks. For those having already a slight knowledge of music reading it is not too late to enter into the work of the first term. Tuition fee will be reduced in proportion to the number of lessons remaining in the term. Prof. Weischkul will also give private lessons in voice culture to those desiring special instruction. Application for membership in the class or for private instruction to be made at Presbyterian church at 8 p. m. each Thursday evening at which time the class meets for the lesson.

Death of W. S. Ladd.

William S. Ladd, a pioneer banker of Portland and one of the wealthiest men on the Pacific coast, died last Friday. His death was due to heart failure. About 9 o'clock that morning he arose and was being dressed by his attendant. Just as his shirt was being drawn over his head he gasped and fell back on the bed. Death was instantaneous and peaceful. Mr. Ladd was born at Holland, Vermont, October 10, 1826. He arrived in Portland in 1851, coming by way of San Francisco. Shortly after his arrival he engaged in the mercantile business on a small scale. In 1859 he organized the banking house of Ladd & Tilton, at the head of which he has since remained. A conservative estimate places his fortune at twenty millions, which is invested in realty and various business interests. For the past fifteen years he had been unable to walk, owing to a stroke of paralysis which deprived him of the use of his lower limbs. Mr. Ladd had for years been interested in Oregon City property, being at one time part owner in the woolen mills. Later he acquired an interest in the flouring mills which holding he had at the time of his death. Among his many other stocks he held a portion of the electric company, which operates between here and Portland.
