COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS.

Recommended Changes to Code—New Plan Adopted for Road Work.

The county court met as per adjournment with all members present. Communication from Lane county relative to needed amendments to the code read, approved and the following resolutions were adopted and copies ordered sent to the senators and representatives at Salem.

WHEREAS, Under section 2735 of the code requiring the sheriff of each county of the state, upon receiving the tax roll from the county clerk, to give notice in each precinct of the county that he or his deputy will be in such precinct at a time specified for at least one day, for the purpose of collecting taxes, and,

WHEREAS, Said notices and visits of the sheriff incur large and needless expense as well as to consume time unnecessarily, and,

WHEREAS, Said visits of the sheriff are attended with great danger to himself and probable loss to the respective counties of the state, therefore be it

RESOLVED, That it is the sense of the county court of Clackamas county Oregon, that said section, 2735 should be repealed by the present session of the legislature.

WHEREAS, The provision of the code, section 2815 to 2819 inclusive requiring the sheriffs of the respective counties of this state to levy warrants for the collection of delinquent taxes, the same as on execution and the parts of said sections relating to sale and returns on said warrants is needless and expensive therefore be it

RESOLVED, By the county court of Clackamas county, Oregon that said section of the code should be amended by the legislative assembly now in session so that no levy or personal notice or service of the warrant for the collection of taxes shall in any case be required, and that publication of notice of sale as now required by statute shall be sufficient notice and all the pre-requisite necessary to a legal sale of all real property, for the collection of delinquent taxes.

WHEREAS, It appears that in the several counties of this state that large numbers of tracts of land are returned to the county courts as unsold for want of bidders at tax sales and

WHEREAS, The several counties incur large expense for levy and advertisement of such lands, therefore be it

RESOLVED, That a law shall be enacted empowering the county judge to bid the amount of taxes and costs on each parcel of land so offered for sale for and on behalf of the county in which said land is situated.

The court had under advisement the dividing of the county into such suitable road districts as will insure better roads. After careful consideration the court determined to form five road districts to comprise all the territory within the county, and to appoint for each district a supervisor to have full charge of all roads in his district and with power to appoint overseers to look after local work.

Under this provision the county was distributed as follows:

- No. 1. All of Clackamas county east and north of the middle line of the Willamette and Clackamas rivers extending to the summit of the Cascades. No. 2. All of Clackamas county east of the Willamette river between Clackamas and Molalla rivers, extending to the summit of the Cascades. No. 3. Includes the corporate limits of Oregon City. No. 4. All that part of the county lying south of the Molalla and east of the Willamette, extending to the summit of the Cascades. No. 5. Comprises all territory in the county west of the center line of the Willamette river.

The following named persons were appointed supervisors: No. 1, Albert Cooke; No. 2, W. H. Smith; No. 3, Street Supt. of Oregon City; No. 4, Ed. P. Carter; No. 5, Geo. W. Prosser. The mileage and per diem was allowed as follows: C. Bair, 1 day and 28 miles, \$5.80; Richard Scott, 1 day and 18 miles, \$4.80.
