A Wonderful Machine.
While in Astoria recently we had the pleasure of watching a type setting machine at work and a curious sight it was. It is impossible to describe minutely the intricate parts composing this almost human machine, and the parts which they play in setting up the many columns of a newspaper. The machine itself is small, occupying floor space perhaps 3 feet by 4 while the extreme height is perhaps eight feet. There is no type about it but instead each character is represented by the moulds for forming the type necessary in printing. A young lady sits by this machine in front of a board like the letters of a type writer. Upon the keys of this she strikes, each blow setting loose the proper representative for a letter—that is the mould for forming it. These are held in a row and the operator is warned when the row is full, the same as on a type writer. When a line the length of the width of a column is set the operator starts the machine by touching a lever, and the moulds are carried along and stopped in front of a pot of melted type metal when a small pump forces a supply of this against the moulds, where it immediately cools and forms one line of the column. It requires only a second for the hot metal to cool, when the machine pushes out a line of type cast in a solid body all ready to be set in the form to print the paper. At the same time an arm carries the moulds each one of which has different notches cut out similar to a Yale lock key up to the top of the machine and sets them down by a screw which carries them along till each reaches its proper place when it falls into position ready to pass around again and help in the work of preparing the paper for its many readers.
