The Canby Saloon License Rejected—Bills Allowed.

County court convened Wednesday of last week and continued in session until Saturday. The full board consisting of Judge Meldrum and Commissioner Bair and Scott were present.

Petition for a change in the Abbott and Gribble prairie road dismissed owing to no appearance being made by the petitioners.

Petition granted for vacation of alley in block 12 in Oswego.

Owing to a double collection of taxes on property belonging to Elmer A. Coe. It was ordered that the sheriff credit Coe to the amount of \$12.50 of this for the year 1893.

On petition of Meade Post, No. 2, G. A. R., for relief of W. M. Westfall, an indigent soldier, it was ordered that \$10 per month be paid to the commander of Meade Post No. 2, for the benefit of said Westfall.

Petition of George Subbauer for a license to sell liquor in Canby refused, his petition containing 83 names, but being outnumbered by the remonstrance.

On recommendation of D. D. Magone, supervisor, an extension of four months time was granted to Andy Fortner and Ransom Saper for payment of damages, to bridge on Springbrook and Leiby road.

On report of H. H. Johnson and D. W. Kinard, experts to examine map made for Clackamas county by J. W. Pettis, it was ordered that a warrant for \$1650, the contract price, be drawn in favor of J. K. Morris, in full payment for said map.

It was ordered that the county recorder transcribe the indexes of the deeds and records of Clackamas county and report at the March term.

The two buildings and most of their contents were destroyed, inflicting a loss of \$2000, about one half covered by insurance. The fire was undoubtedly of incendiary origin.
